### AN ACT

To designate Mount Young in the State of Alaska, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.				
2	This Act may be cited as the "Don Young Recogni-				
3	tion Act".				
4	SEC. 2. FINDINGS.				
5	Congress finds that—				
6	(1) on June 9, 1933, Donald Edwin Young wa				
7	born to James Young and Nora (Bucy) Young i				
8	Meridian, California;				
9	(2) Don Young earned—				
10	(A) an associate degree from Yuba Junior				
11	College; and				
12	(B) a bachelor's degree in teaching from				
13	Chico State University;				
14	(3) from 1955 to 1957, Don Young began dec-				
15	ades of service to the United States when he serve				
16	in the Army as part of the 41st Tank Battalion;				
17	(4) in 1959, Don Young moved to Alaska and				
18	found his true home in the village of Fort Yukon,				
19	which is located 7 miles above the Arctic Circle;				
20	(5) Don Young met and married the first love				
21	of his life, Lula "Lu" Young, in Fort Yukon;				
22	(6) Don and Lu Young had—				
23	(A) 2 wonderful daughters, Joni and Dawn				
24	(Sister); and				
25	(B) 14 grandchildren;				
26	(7) Don Young—				

1	(A) taught fifth grade at a school run by					
2	the Bureau of Indian Affairs during the winter;					
3	and					
4	(B) during the warmer months, worked—					
5	(i) in construction, mining, fishing,					
6	and trapping; and					
7	(ii) as a tugboat captain;					
8	(8) Don Young—					
9	(A) was elected mayor of Fort Yukon in					
10	1964; and					
11	(B) served as mayor of Fort Yukon until					
12	1967;					
13	(9) Don Young was elected to and served in—					
14	(A) the Alaska House of Representatives					
15	from 1967 to 1970; and					
16	(B) the Alaska State Senate from 1970 to					
17	1973;					
18	(10) Don Young—					
19	(A) was elected to the House of Represent-					
20	atives in 1973 in a special election; and					
21	(B) served 24 additional consecutive terms					
22	in the House of Representatives;					
23	(11) Representative Don Young served as—					

1	(A) the Chair of the Committee on Natural					
2	Resources of the House of Representatives from					
3	1995 to 2001; and					
4	(B) the Chair of Committee on Transpor-					
5	tation and Infrastructure of the House of Rep-					
6	resentatives from 2001 to 2007;					
7	(12) Representative Don Young was a cham-					
8	pion for Alaska Natives, including as Chair of the					
9	Subcommittee on Indian, Insular and Alaska Native					
10	Affairs of the Committee on Natural Resources of					
11	the House of Representatives;					
12	(13) Representative Don Young—					
13	(A) fiercely defended Alaska and Alaskans					
14	as the sole Representative for the largest State					
15	in the United States; and					
16	(B) devoted himself to fulfilling the im-					
17	mense promise of his home State;					
18	(14) Representative Don Young was a leader in					
19	strengthening the role of Alaska in providing for the					
20	national defense of the United States through his—					
21	(A) support for—					
22	(i) the Coast Guard;					
23	(ii) the Alaskan Command; and					
24	(iii) the ballistic missile defense; and					

1	(B) steadfast commitment to the leader-					
2	ship of the United States in the Arctic;					
3	(15) Representative Don Young—					
4	(A) sponsored not fewer than 85 bills that					
5	were enacted into Federal law; and					
6	(B) sponsored and cosponsored many more					
7	measures that were part of broader legislation					
8	(16) legislative achievements by Representative					
9	Don Young span the policy spectrum, from author-					
10	izing the construction of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline					
11	System to important amendments and the Alaska					
12	Native Claims Settlement Act (43 U.S.C. 1601 et					
13	seq.);					
14	(17) Representative Don Young authored and					
15	advocated for generational laws, including—					
16	(A) the Indian Self-Determination and					
17	Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 5301 et					
18	seq.) in 1975;					
19	(B) the Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Con-					
20	servation and Management Act (16 U.S.C.					
21	1801 et seq.) in 1976;					
22	(C) the National Wildlife Refuge System					
23	Improvement Act of 1997 (Public Law 105–57;					
24	111 Stat. 1252) in 1997;					

1	(D) SAFETEA-LU (Public Law 109–59;					
2	119 Stat. 1144) in 2005;					
3	(E) the Multinational Species Conservation					
4	Funds Reauthorization Act of 2007 (Public					
5	Law 110–132; 121 Stat. 1360) in 2007; and					
6	(F) the Infrastructure Investment and					
7	Jobs Act (Public Law 117–58; 135 Stat. 429)					
8	in 2021;					
9	(18) Representative Don Young—					
10	(A) formed strong relationships and friend-					
11	ships with Members of Congress on both sides					
12	of the aisle; and					
13	(B) proudly worked with 10 different					
14	Presidents;					
15	(19) in 2015, Representative Don Young mar-					
16	ried his second love, Anne Garland Walton, in the					
17	United States Capitol;					
18	(20) on December 5, 2017, Representative Don					
19	Young became the 45th Dean of the House of Rep-					
20	resentatives, reflecting his status as the most senior					
21	Member of the House of Representatives;					
22	(21) Representative Don Young was the long-					
23	est-serving Republican in the history of Congress;					
24	and					

- 1 (22) Representative Don Young ultimately
- 2 served the 49th State with dedication and distinction
- for 49 years and 13 days, which is more than <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of
- 4 the period during which Alaska has been a State.

#### 5 SEC. 3. DESIGNATION OF MOUNT YOUNG, ALASKA.

- 6 (a) Designation.—Not later than 30 days after the
- 7 date of enactment of this Act, the Board on Geographic
- 8 Names shall designate the 2,598-foot volcanic peak known
- 9 as "Mount Cerberus" located at 51.93569°N,
- 10 179.5848°E, on Semisopochnoi Island in the State of
- 11 Alaska as "Mount Young".
- 12 (b) References.—Any reference in a law, map, reg-
- 13 ulation, document, paper, or other record of the United
- 14 States to the mountain peak described in subsection (a)
- 15 shall be deemed to be a reference to "Mount Young".

#### 16 SEC. 4. DESIGNATION OF DON YOUNG ALASKA JOB CORPS

- 17 CENTER.
- 18 (a) Designation.—The Job Corps center located at
- 19 800 East Lynn Martin Drive in Palmer, Alaska, shall be
- 20 known and designated as the "Don Young Alaska Job
- 21 Corps Center".
- 22 (b) References.—Any reference in a law, map, reg-
- 23 ulation, document, paper, or other record of the United
- 24 States to the Job Corps center described in subsection (a)

- 1 shall be deemed to be a reference to the "Don Young Alas-
- 2 ka Job Corps Center".
- 3 SEC. 5. DESIGNATION OF DON YOUNG FEDERAL OFFICE
- 4 **BUILDING.**
- 5 (a) Designation.—The Federal office building lo-
- 6 cated at 101 12th Avenue in Fairbanks, Alaska, shall be
- 7 known and designated as the "Don Young Federal Office
- 8 Building".
- 9 (b) References.—Any reference in a law, map, reg-
- 10 ulation, document, paper, or other record of the United
- 11 States to the Federal office building described in sub-
- 12 section (a) shall be deemed to be a reference to the "Don
- 13 Young Federal Office Building".
