Daniel is policy director at Demand Progress Education Fund, a project of the New Venture Fund, and policy director at Demand Progress, a project of the SixteenThirty Fund. He leads the projects' efforts on issues that concern strengthening Congress; governmental transparency, accountability, and reform; and civil liberties and national security. He devotes significant time to modernizing the operations of Congress.

Daniel is a nationally recognized expert on federal government transparency, accountability, and congressional capacity. He has testified before Congress and his work has been covered by the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, *NPR*, *Roll Call*, *Politico*, *FedScoop*, *Wired*, *The Hill*, *C-SPAN*, and other news outlets.

Daniel is the organization's lead policy advocate. He is the editor of the *First Branch Forecast*, a weekly newsletter that explores the Legislative branch and government transparency. Daniel co-founded the Congressional Data Coalition, which brings together organizations from across the political spectrum to advocate for modernizing congressional technology and data practices. He directs the Advisory Committee on Transparency, which supports the work of the Congressional Transparency Caucus. And he coordinates the Transparency Roundtable, a bipartisan coalition of organizations focused on improving federal government transparency. DPEF's website EveryCRSReport.com, which publishes Congressional Research Service Reports, has more than 400,000 unique visitors each month. Daniel frequently conducts research into the operations of Congress, much of which is available at demandprogress.org/reports.

Daniel previously worked as policy director at Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington; policy counsel at the Sunlight Foundation; and as a legislative attorney with the Congressional Research Service. He graduated *cum laude* from Emory University School of Law. He also worked at the Constitution Project, the American Constitution Society, the House of Representatives, and the Georgia Trial Lawyers Association.
