H. R. 2950

AN ACT

To authorize the Secretary of the Interior, through the Coastal Program of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, to work with willing partners and provide support to efforts to assess, protect, restore, and enhance important coastal landscapes that provide fish and wildlife habitat on which certain Federal trust species depend, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Coastal Habitat Con-
3 servation Act of 2023”.

4 **SEC. 2. PURPOSE.**

5 The purpose of this Act is to legislatively authorize
6 the Coastal Program of the Service in effect as of the date
7 of the enactment of this Act to conduct collaborative land-
8 scape-level planning and on-the-ground coastal habitat as-
9 sessment, coastal habitat protection, coastal habitat res-
10 toration, and coastal habitat enhancement projects in pri-
11 ority coastal landscapes to conserve and recover Federal
12 trust species.

13 **SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.**

14 In this Act:

15 (1) COASTAL ECOSYSTEM.—The term “coastal
16 ecosystem” means a biological community of orga-
17 nisms interacting with each other and their habitats
18 in a coastal landscape.

19 (2) COASTAL HABITAT ASSESSMENT.—The
20 term “coastal habitat assessment” means the proc-
21 ess of evaluating the physical, chemical, and biologi-
22 cal function of a coastal site to determine the value
23 of the site to fish and wildlife.

24 (3) COASTAL HABITAT ENHANCEMENT.—The
25 term “coastal habitat enhancement” means the ma-
26 nipulation of the physical, chemical, or biological

1 characteristics of a coastal ecosystem to increase or
2 decrease specific biological functions that make the
3 ecosystem valuable to fish and wildlife.

4 (4) COASTAL HABITAT PLANNING.—The term
5 “coastal habitat planning” means the process of de-
6 veloping a comprehensive plan that—

7 (A) characterizes a coastal ecosystem;

8 (B) sets protection, restoration, or en-
9 hancement goals and identifies the priorities of
10 those goals;

11 (C) describes conservation strategies and
12 methodologies;

13 (D) establishes a timetable for implementa-
14 tion of the plan; and

15 (E) identifies roles of participants and
16 stakeholders.

17 (5) COASTAL HABITAT PROTECTION.—

18 (A) IN GENERAL.—The term “coastal
19 habitat protection” means a long-term action to
20 safeguard habitat of value to fish and wildlife
21 in a coastal ecosystem.

22 (B) INCLUSION.—The term “coastal habi-
23 tat protection” includes activities to support es-
24 tablishment of a conservation easement or fee

1 title acquisition by Federal and non-Federal
2 partners.

3 (6) COASTAL HABITAT RESTORATION.—The
4 term “coastal habitat restoration” means the manip-
5 ulation of the physical, chemical, or biological char-
6 acteristics of a coastal ecosystem with the goal of re-
7 turning, to the maximum extent practicable, the full
8 natural biological functions to lost or degraded na-
9 tive habitat.

10 (7) COASTAL LANDSCAPE.—The term “coastal
11 landscape” means a portion of a coastal ecosystem
12 within or adjacent to a coastal State that contains
13 various habitat types, including—

14 (A) a fresh or saltwater wetland in a coast-
15 al watershed;

16 (B) a coastal river, stream, or waterway;

17 (C) a coastal bay or estuary;

18 (D) a seagrass bed, reef, or other near-
19 shore marine habitat;

20 (E) a beach or dune system;

21 (F) a mangrove forest; and

22 (G) an associated coastal upland.

23 (8) COASTAL STATE.—The term “coastal
24 State” means—

(A) a State in, or bordering on, the Atlantic, Pacific, or Arctic Ocean, the Gulf of Mexico, the Long Island Sound, or 1 or more of the Great Lakes;

(B) the District of Columbia;

(C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;

(D) Guam;

(E) American Samoa;

(F) the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands;

(G) the Federated States of Micronesia;

(H) the Republic of the Marshall Islands;

(I) the Republic of Palau; and

(J) the United States Virgin Islands.

(9) FEDERAL TRUST SPECIES.—The term “Federal trust species” means migratory birds, threatened species or endangered species listed under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.), interjurisdictional fish, and marine mammals for which the Secretary has management authority.

(10) FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.—The term “financial assistance” means Federal funding provided to Federal, State, local, or Tribal governments, non-governmental institutions, nonprofit organizations,

1 and private individuals and entities through a grant
2 or cooperative agreement.

3 (11) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary”
4 means the Secretary of the Interior.

5 (12) SERVICE.—The term “Service” means the
6 United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

7 (13) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—The term
8 “technical assistance” means a collaboration, facili-
9 tation, or consulting action relating to a coastal
10 habitat planning, coastal habitat assessment, coastal
11 habitat protection, coastal habitat restoration, or
12 coastal habitat enhancement project or initiative in
13 which the Service contributes scientific knowledge,
14 skills, and expertise to the project or initiative.

15 **SEC. 4. COASTAL PROGRAM.**

16 The Secretary shall carry out the Coastal Program
17 within the Service to—

18 (1) identify the leading threats to priority
19 coastal landscapes and conservation actions to ad-
20 dress those threats in partnership with Federal,
21 State, local, and Tribal governments, nongovern-
22 mental institutions, nonprofit organizations, and pri-
23 vate individuals and entities;

24 (2) provide technical assistance and financial
25 assistance through partnerships with Federal, State,

1 local, and Tribal governments, nongovernmental in-
2 stitutions, nonprofit organizations, and private indi-
3 viduals and entities to conduct voluntary coastal
4 habitat planning, coastal habitat assessment, coastal
5 habitat protection, coastal habitat restoration, and
6 coastal habitat enhancement projects on public land
7 or private land;

8 (3) ensure the health and resilience of coastal
9 ecosystems through adaptive management proce-
10 dures based on the best available science;

11 (4) build the capacity of Federal, State, local,
12 and Tribal governments, nongovernmental institu-
13 tions, nonprofit organizations, and private individ-
14 uals and entities to carry out environmental con-
15 servation and stewardship measures;

16 (5) assist in the development and implementa-
17 tion of monitoring protocols to ensure the success of
18 coastal ecosystem restoration and coastal ecosystem
19 enhancement measures; and

20 (6) collaborate and share information with part-
21 ners and the public relating to best management
22 practices for the conservation, restoration, and en-
23 hancement of coastal ecosystems.

1 **SEC. 5. REPORTS.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the
3 date of the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter,
4 the Secretary, acting through the Director of the Service,
5 shall submit to the Committees on Appropriations and
6 Natural Resources of the House of Representatives and
7 the Committees on Appropriations and Environment and
8 Public Works of the Senate, and make available to the
9 public on the website of the Service, a report on the Coast-
10 al Program carried out under this Act.

11 (b) REQUIREMENTS.—Each report submitted under
12 subsection (a) shall assess on regional and nationwide
13 bases—

14 (1) Coastal Program work on coastal eco-
15 systems;

16 (2) progress made by the Coastal Program to-
17 ward identifying the leading threats to priority
18 coastal landscapes and conservation actions to ad-
19 dress those threats; and

20 (3) prospects for, and success of, protecting, re-
21 storing, and enhancing coastal ecosystems.

22 (c) INCLUSIONS.—Each report submitted under sub-
23 section (a) shall include—

24 (1) quantitative information on coastal land-
25 scapes protected, restored, or enhanced;

- 1 (2) funds appropriated to the Coastal Program
2 that have been expended or leveraged;
3 (3) a description of adaptive management prac-
4 tices implemented; and
5 (4) a description of emerging challenges or data
6 gaps that hinder the ability of the Coastal Program
7 to achieve the purpose of this Act.

8 **SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

9 There is authorized to be appropriated to carry out
10 this Act \$16,957,000 for each of fiscal years 2024 through
11 2028.
