A BILL

To establish within the Department of Justice an Office for Missing and Murdered Black Women and Girls.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Britanny Clardy Miss-
3 ing and Murdered Black Women and Girls Act”.

4 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

5 Congress finds the following:

6 (1) Black women and girls are uniquely vulner-
7 able and too easily erased from public discussions
8 about missing and murdered people.

9 (2) According to the National Crime Informa-
10 tion Center, in 2020, of the 268,884 girls and
11 women reported missing, 90,333, or nearly 34 per-
12 cent, were Black, while Black girls and women make
13 up only 15 percent of the female population in the
14 United States.

15 (3) Nationally, cases involving Black girls and
16 women stay open four times longer than other cases
17 on average, as reported by Convention on the Elimi-
18 nation of Racial Discrimination.

19 (4) Nationally, Black women have the highest
20 rates of death due to homicide among women (4.4.
21 per 100,000 compared to 1.5 per 100,000 for White
22 women) and statistically shown these murders are
23 most often committed by an intimate partner or
24 someone the victim knows.

25 (5) Understanding the roots of how and why
26 Black women and girls are not as well protected

1 from violence as White women and girls requires at-
2 tention to both historical and present-day manifesta-
3 tions of interlocking systems of oppression, such as
4 racism and sexism.

5 (6) Effective research regarding the racial in-
6 equities surrounding violence against women and
7 girls should—

8 (A) involve local, relevant community en-
9 gaged research expertise in the area;

10 (B) seek to center community members as
11 essential experts through interviews and focus
12 groups with Black women and girls who have
13 lived experience within the topic;

14 (C) include the use of mixed methods ap-
15 proaches to evaluate, monitor, and communicate
16 data with the broader impacted communities;
17 and

18 (D) include a long-term evaluation plan to
19 assess the impact of the data collection efforts
20 and involve data specialists or consultants
21 equipped to build tracking and reporting infra-
22 structure.

23 (7) That considering all the facts above, the ex-
24 isting Federal resources dedicated to combatting vio-
25 lence against women and girls is not enough to ad-

1 dress this problem and additional resources must be
2 targeted directly to protecting, supporting and pro-
3 viding justice to Black women and girl in the United
4 States.

5 **SEC. 3. OFFICE FOR MISSING AND MURDERED BLACK**
6 **WOMEN AND GIRLS.**

7 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established within
8 the Department of Justice an Office for Missing and Mur-
9 dered Black Women and Girls (hereinafter referred to as
10 the “Office”), which shall be headed by a Director ap-
11 pointed by the Attorney General.

12 (b) PERSONNEL AND FUNDS.—Not later than 90
13 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Attor-
14 ney General shall provide to the Office such personnel and
15 funds as necessary to establish and operate the Office as
16 a component of the Department.

17 (c) DUTIES OF OFFICE.—The Director of the Office
18 shall—

19 (1) serve as the legal and policy advisor to the
20 Attorney General to ensure justice for missing and
21 murdered Black women and girls;

22 (2) develop recommendations for policies to ad-
23 dress injustice in the criminal justice system’s re-
24 sponse to cases of missing and murdered Black
25 women and girls;

1 (3) establish a national advisory commission of
2 Black women and girls who have experienced vio-
3 lence, abduction, or trafficking, and family members
4 who have lost a loved one to this violence;

5 (4) coordinate with the relevant Federal agen-
6 cies, the national advisory commission established in
7 paragraph (3), State, local, and Tribal agencies, and
8 local family services agencies to—

9 (A) collect data on missing person and
10 homicide cases involving Black women and
11 girls, including the total number of cases, the
12 rate at which the cases are solved, the length of
13 time the cases remain open, and a comparison
14 to similar cases involving different demographic
15 groups;

16 (B) collect data on Amber Alerts, including
17 the total number of Amber Alerts issued, the
18 total number of Amber Alerts that involve
19 Black girls, and the outcome of cases involving
20 Amber Alerts disaggregated by the child's race
21 and sex;

22 (C) collect data on reports of missing
23 Black girls, including the number classified as
24 voluntary runaways, and a comparison to simi-

1 lar cases involving different demographic
2 groups; and

3 (D) conduct case reviews and report on the
4 results of such reviews for cases involving missing
5 and murdered Black women and girls, in-
6 cluding—

7 (i) cold cases for missing Black
8 women and girls; and

9 (ii) death investigation review for
10 cases of Black women and girls ruled as
11 suicide or overdose under suspicious cir-
12 cumstances.

13 (5) develop tools and processes to evaluate the
14 implementation and impact of the efforts of the Of-
15 fice;

16 (6) facilitate technical assistance for State,
17 local, and Tribal law enforcement agencies during
18 active cases involving missing and murdered Black
19 women and girls; and

20 (7) create and maintain a centralized data re-
21 pository and public dashboard for the tracking of
22 missing and Murdered Black women and girls.

23 (d) REPORT REQUIRED.—

24 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than the first Jan-
25 uary 15th after the date of enactment of this Act,

1 and biennially thereafter, the Director of the Office,
2 in coordination with the relevant Federal agencies
3 and State, local, and Tribal agencies, shall submit a
4 report to the covered committees on missing and
5 murdered Black women and girls, including—

6 (A) an analysis and assessment of any

7 data collected in subsection (c)(4);

8 (B) an analysis and assessment on the
9 intersection between cases involving missing
10 and murdered Black women and girls and labor
11 trafficking and sex trafficking;

12 (C) any findings derived from the case re-
13 views conducted under subsection (c)(4)(D);

14 (D) an analysis of any case review con-
15 ducted relating to the prosecution and sen-
16 tencing for cases where a perpetrator com-
17 mitted a violent or exploitative crime against a
18 Black woman or girl;

19 (E) reviews sentencing guidelines for
20 crimes related to missing and murdered Black
21 women and girls; and

22 (F) recommendations for policies to ad-
23 dress to the criminal justice system's response
24 to cases of missing and murdered Black women
25 and girls, including—

1 (i) the intersection between cases in-
2 volving missing and murdered Black
3 women and girls and labor trafficking and
4 sex trafficking; and

5 (ii) analyze and assess the intersection
6 between cases involving murdered Black
7 women and girls and domestic violence, in-
8 cluding prior instances of domestic violence
9 within the family or relationship, whether
10 an offender had prior convictions for do-
11 mestic assault or related offenses, and
12 whether the offender used a firearm in the
13 murder or any prior instances of domestic
14 assault.

15 (2) COVERED COMMITTEES DEFINED.—In this
16 subsection, the term “covered committees” means
17 the Committee on the Judiciary and the Committee
18 on Homeland Security of the House of Representa-
19 tives and the Committee on the Judiciary and the
20 Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental
21 Affairs of the Senate.

22 **SEC. 4. GRANTS TO COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS**
23 **TO PROVIDE CERTAIN SERVICES.**

24 (a) GRANT PROGRAM ESTABLISHED.—Not later than
25 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the

1 Director of the Office shall establish a grant program to
2 provide grants to community-based organizations that
3 provide services designed to prevent or end the targeting
4 of Black women or girls or provide assistance to victims
5 of offenses that targeted Black women or girls.

6 (b) GRANT AWARD.—Community-based organiza-
7 tions awarded a grant under this section shall use the
8 amount awarded under the grant program to—

9 (1) provide culturally appropriate services de-
10 signed to reduce or prevent crimes that target Black
11 women or girls;

12 (2) provide culturally appropriate training re-
13 lated to the handling of situations and crimes tar-
14 geting of Black women and girls, including training
15 for law enforcement officers, county attorneys, city
16 attorneys, judges, and other criminal justice part-
17 ners; and

18 (3) provide victim services or survivorship sup-
19 port to Black women and girls who are victims of
20 crimes or other offenses or to the family members of
21 missing and murdered Black women and girls.
