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## A BILL

To improve the President's Cup Cybersecurity Competitions.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Industrial Control Sys-  
5       tems Cybersecurity Competition Act”.

1   **SEC. 2. PRESIDENT'S CUP CYBERSECURITY COMPETITIONS.**

2       Section 7121(d) of the James M. Inhofe National De-  
3 fense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2023 (6 U.S.C.  
4 665m(d)) is amended—

5               (1) by striking paragraph (3);  
6               (2) by redesignating paragraphs (1), (2), and  
7 (4) as subparagraphs (A), (B), and (C), respectively,  
8 and adjusting the margin accordingly;

9               (3) by striking “Each competition” and insert-  
10 ing the following:

11               “(1) IN GENERAL.—Each competition”,  
12               (4) in subparagraph (C) of paragraph (1), as so  
13 redesignated, by striking “paragraphs (1), (2), or  
14 (3)” and inserting “subparagraph (A) or (B)”; and

15               (5) by adding at the end the following:

16               “(2) BIENNIAL REQUIREMENTS.—Not less fre-  
17 quently than every second competition, the competi-  
18 tion shall incorporate categories demonstrating of-  
19 fensive and defensive cyber operations involving—

20               “(A) information technology (as defined in  
21 section 11101 of title 40, United States Code),  
22 such as software reverse engineering and exploi-  
23 tation, network operations, forensics, big data  
24 analysis, cyber analysis, cyber defense, cyber ex-  
25 ploitation, secure programming, and obfuscated  
26 coding;

1               “(B) operational technology (as defined in  
2               section 3 of the IoT Cybersecurity Improvement  
3               Act of 2020 (15 U.S.C. 278g–3a)) or industrial  
4               control systems (as defined in section 2220C of  
5               the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C.  
6               665i)), such as knowledge of supervisory control  
7               and data acquisition systems and the protocols  
8               and communication methods used in these sys-  
9               tems; detection of anomalies; and responding to  
10               and recovering after incidents involving such  
11               systems; or  
12               “(C) any other category of technological  
13               system requiring cybersecurity or information  
14               security, as determined appropriate by the Di-  
15               rector.”.

16 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

17       *This Act may be cited as the “Industrial Control Sys-  
18 tems Cybersecurity Competition Act”.*

19 **SEC. 2. PRESIDENT’S CUP CYBERSECURITY COMPETITIONS.**

20       (a) *IN GENERAL.—Section 7121 of the James M.  
21 Inhofe National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year  
22 2023 (6 U.S.C. 665m) is amended—*

23               (1) *in subsection (d)—*

24               (A) *by striking paragraph (3);*

(B) by redesignating paragraphs (1), (2), and (4) as subparagraphs (A), (B), and (C), respectively, and adjusting the margin accordingly;

(C) by striking “Each competition” and inserting the following:

7               “(1) *IN GENERAL*.—*Each competition*”;

(D) in subparagraph (C) of paragraph (1),  
as so redesignated, by striking “paragraphs (1),  
(2), or (3)” and inserting “subparagraph (A) or  
(B)”; and

12 (E) by adding at the end the following:

“(2) BIENNIAL REQUIREMENTS.—Not less frequently than every second competition, the competition shall incorporate categories demonstrating offensive and defensive cyber operations involving—

17                 “(A) information technology (as defined in  
18 section 11101 of title 40, United States Code),  
19 such as software reverse engineering and exploi-  
20 tation, network operations, forensics, big data  
21 analysis, cyber analysis, cyber defense, cyber ex-  
22 ploitation, secure programming, and obfuscated  
23 coding;

24                   “(B) operational technology (as defined in  
25                   section 3 of the IoT Cybersecurity Improvement

1       *Act of 2020 (15 U.S.C. 278g–3a)) or industrial*  
2       *control systems (as defined in section 2220C of*  
3       *the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C.*  
4       *665i)), such as knowledge of supervisory control*  
5       *and data acquisition systems and the protocols*  
6       *and communication methods used in such sys-*  
7       *tems, detection of anomalies, exploitation of*  
8       *operational technology or industrial control sys-*  
9       *tems, and responding to and recovering after in-*  
10      *cidents involving operational technology or in-*  
11      *dustrial control systems; or*

12      “*(C) any other category of technological sys-*  
13      *tem requiring cybersecurity or information secu-*  
14      *rity, as determined appropriate by the Direc-*  
15      *tor.”;*

16      *(2) in subsection (e)(1)—*

17      *(A) in subparagraph (A), by inserting “,*  
18      *which shall not exceed 20 percent of the amounts*  
19      *made available for the competition during any*  
20      *fiscal year” after “the competition”;*

21      *(B) in subparagraph (B), by inserting “,*  
22      *which shall not exceed 20 percent of the amounts*  
23      *made available for the competition during any*  
24      *fiscal year” after “integrity of the competition”;*

“(h) *LIMITATION*.—The Director may not hold an annual cybersecurity competition under this section for a year until after the Director submits the report required under subsection (g) with respect to the competition held under this section during the previous year.

15       “(i) *SUNSET*.—The Director may not conduct a com-  
16 petition under the authority under this section on or after  
17 the first day of the first year that begins more than 5 years  
18 after the date of enactment of the Industrial Control Sys-  
19 tems Cybersecurity Competition Act.”.

20           (b) NO NEW FUNDING.—No additional funds are au-  
21 thorized to be appropriated for the purpose of carrying out  
22 the amendments made by this Act.



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
