Mr. VANCE (for himself and Mr. LEE) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations

A BILL

To strengthen reporting requirements for United States assistance to Ukraine.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Ukraine Aid Transparency Act of 2024”.

6 **SEC. 2. QUARTERLY REPORT ON ACCOUNTING OF UNITED**
7 **STATES ASSISTANCE FOR UKRAINE.**

8 Section 1250B(c) of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2024 (Public Law 118–31) is
9 amended—

1 (1) by striking “Not later” and inserting the
2 following:

3 “(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later”;

4 (2) by inserting “, working through the Direc-
5 tor of the Office of Management and Budget, and in
6 consultation with the Secretary of Defense, the Sec-
7 retary of State, and the Administrator of the United
8 States Agency for International Development,” after
9 “President”; and

10 (3) by adding at the end the following:

11 “(2) CONTENTS.—Each report published pursu-
12 ant to paragraph (1) shall include, with respect to
13 the reporting period—

14 “(A) a detailed accounting of all United
15 States government-wide expenditures for
16 Ukraine and countries impacted by the situa-
17 tion in Ukraine since February 24, 2022, pre-
18 sented as a total figure and disaggregated by
19 appropriations account, including—

20 “(i) amounts provided through the
21 regular appropriations process;

22 “(ii) amounts provided through sup-
23 plemental appropriations Acts;

1 “(iii) any transfers or
2 reprogrammingms of funds made to facil-
3 itate aid to Ukraine;

4 “(iv) any amounts expended or outlaid
5 to respond to the situation in Ukraine; and

6 “(v) total budget authority relating to
7 the amounts described in clauses (i)
8 through (iv), after transfers and
9 reprogrammingms, including previous or pro-
10 spective no-year or multi-year funds;

11 “(B) a detailed accounting, presented in
12 accordance with United States Federal budg-
13 eting terminology, of the amount that allied
14 partners (disaggregated by country) have ap-
15 propriated, committed, obligated, or outlaid to
16 respond to the situation in Ukraine and coun-
17 tries impacted by the situation in Ukraine, in
18 comparison with the amount appropriated, com-
19 mitted, obligated, and outlaid by the United
20 States to respond to the situation in Ukraine
21 and countries impacted by the situation in
22 Ukraine;

23 “(C) a detailed list of all weapons and
24 weapon systems sent to Ukraine (including the
25 value of such weapons, presented in accordance

1 with United States Federal budgeting termin-
2 ology) by—

3 “(i) the United States; and
4 “(ii) partner or allied governments,
5 disaggregated by country;

6 “(D) a detailed accounting of the remain-
7 ing funds authorized to be disbursed by the
8 United States to Ukraine and countries im-
9 pacted by the situation in Ukraine;

10 “(E) the value of the presidential draw-
11 down authority provided by past supplemental
12 bills under section 506(a)(1) of the Foreign As-
13 sistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2318(a)(1))
14 and other authorities that remain available to
15 transfer weapons and equipment to Ukraine,
16 disaggregated by authority;

17 “(F) a detailed accounting of any out-
18 standing or anticipated costs to be incurred by
19 the United States in relation to United States
20 assistance for Ukraine and countries impacted
21 by the situation in Ukraine that has not been
22 explicitly provided for in appropriations Acts
23 and other relevant information, including—

24 “(i) the dollar value multiplier, cal-
25 culated both in total and for each of the 4

1 supplemental appropriations Acts, between
2 authority provided to transfer weapons to
3 Ukraine and the funding that would be re-
4 quired to replace such weapons and return
5 United States weapon stockpiles to their
6 respective levels prior to the transfer of
7 such weapons to Ukraine;

8 “(ii) the full cost, including antici-
9 pated costs associated with replacing weap-
10 ons transferred to Ukraine;

11 “(iii) the total funding appropriated,
12 committed, obligated, and outlaid to re-
13 place United States weapons that are
14 transferred to Ukraine; and

15 “(iv) any anticipated deficit between
16 currently appropriated stock replenishment
17 and the cost of replacing weapons sent to
18 Ukraine from United States stocks; and

19 “(G) a list of the countries that are eligible
20 for United States foreign assistance as a result
21 of being impacted by the situation in Ukraine.

22 “(3) FORM.—

23 “(A) IN GENERAL.—Each report published
24 pursuant to paragraph (1) shall be submitted in
25 unclassified form.

1 “(B) CLASSIFIED ANNEX.—If the Presi-
2 dent determines that a classified annex is need-
3 ed to clarify any information contained in the
4 report published pursuant to paragraph (1),
5 such an annex shall be made available to any
6 Member of Congress, upon request, and the
7 President shall submit such an annex to—

8 “(i) the Committee on Appropriations
9 of the Senate;

10 “(ii) the Committee on Armed Serv-
11 ices of the Senate;

12 “(iii) the Committee on Foreign Rela-
13 tions of the Senate;

14 “(iv) the Committee on Homeland Se-
15 curity and Governmental Affairs of the
16 Senate;

17 “(v) the Committee on Appropriations
18 of the House of Representatives;

19 “(vi) the Committee on Armed Serv-
20 ices of the House of Representatives;

21 “(vii) the Committee on Foreign Af-
22 fairs of the House of Representatives; and

1 “(viii) the Committee on Oversight
2 and Accountability of the House of Rep-
3 resentatives.”.
