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## A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Interior to enter into an agreement with the National Academy of Sciences to carry out a study on reservation systems for Federal land.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       *This Act may be cited as the “Review and Evaluation*  
5       *of Strategies for Equal Reservations for Visitor Experi-*

1 ences Federal Land Act" or the "RESERVE Federal  
2 Land Act".

3 **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**

4       **In this Act:**

5           (1) **BOOKING WINDOW.**—The term "booking  
6 window", with respect to a reservation system,  
7 means the time period during which a reservation or  
8 lottery entry is available to the public.

9           (2) **FEDERAL LAND.**—The term "Federal land"  
10 means—

11               (A) public lands (as defined in section 103  
12 of the Federal Land Policy and Management  
13 Act of 1976 (43 U.S.C. 1702));

14               (B) National Forest System land;

15               (C) units of the National Park System;

16               (D) units of the National Wildlife Refuge  
17 System;

18               (E) sites administered by the Bureau of  
19 Reclamation; and

20               (F) sites administered by the Corps of En-  
21 gineers.

22           (3) **RECREATION ACTIVITY.**—The term "recre-  
23 ation activity" includes camping, backpacking,  
24 climbing, fishing, hiking, driving, and other re-  
25 creational opportunities.

1                   **(4) RESERVATION SYSTEM.—**

2                   **(A) IN GENERAL.**—The term “reservation  
3                   system” means any platform or method used by  
4                   managers of Federal land to ration recreation  
5                   activities.

6                   **(B) INCLUSIONS.**—The term “reservation  
7                   system” includes reservation, lottery, metering,  
8                   pricing, merit-based, and other similar rationing  
9                   methods via online, telephone, paper, in-person,  
10                  or other methods.

11                  **(5) SECRETARY.**—The term “Secretary” means  
12                  the Secretary of the Interior.

13                  **SEC. 3. NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES STUDY OF RES-**  
14                  **ERVATION SYSTEMS FOR RECREATION AC-**  
15                  **TIVITIES ON FEDERAL LAND.**

16                  **(a) STUDY.**

17                  **(1) IN GENERAL.**—The Secretary, in coordination  
18                  with the Secretary of Agriculture and the Secretary  
19                  of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers,  
20                  shall, not later than 60 days after the date  
21                  of enactment of this Act, enter into an agreement  
22                  with the National Academy of Sciences to carry out  
23                  a study of reservation systems for recreation activities  
24                  on Federal land.

1                             (2) REQUIREMENTS.—In carrying out the study  
2       under paragraph (1), the National Academy of  
3       Sciences shall carry out the following:

4                             (A) A comprehensive review of the history  
5       of reservation systems, such as recreation.gov,  
6       including a review of—

7                                 (i) the studies that led to the estab-  
8       lishment of the applicable reservation sys-  
9       tem;

10                                 (ii) the iterations of the applicable  
11       reservation system over time to meet the  
12       needs of the applicable Federal agency;  
13       and

14                                 (iii) any visitor feedback provided with  
15       respect to the applicable reservation sys-  
16       tem.

17                             (B) Based on available data and existing  
18       research, answer the following questions:

19                                 (i) What are the benefits and chal-  
20       lenges of implementing reservation systems  
21       for visitor management and conservation  
22       goals for Federal land?

23                                 (ii) What data are available to under-  
24       stand demand for recreation on Federal  
25       land? How can the data be used to balance

10 (iv) What best practices should guide  
11 reservation system design, including diver-  
12 sity of rationing mechanisms and booking  
13 windows, and would promote equal access  
14 to recreation activities? What metrics can  
15 be used to record outcomes of reservation  
16 system design?

1           could dissemination of information with re-

3           (vi) What are the odds of success with  
4           respect to securing a reservation under res-  
5           ervation systems? How are the odds of suc-  
6           cess disseminated to users? How could dis-  
7           semination of information with respect to  
8           the odds of success be improved?

9           (vii) How are data, including data col-  
10          lected by contractors, on reservation sys-  
11          tems shared with Federal land managers,  
12          researchers, and the public? How can  
13          transparency be improved to inform the  
14          decisionmaking of users of reservation sys-  
15          tems?

16        (b) REPORT.—The agreement entered into under  
17        subsection (a)(1) shall include a requirement that, not  
18        later than 18 months after the date of enactment of this  
19        Act, the National Academy of Sciences shall submit to the  
20        appropriate committees of Congress a report that de-  
21        scribes the results of the study carried out under sub-  
22        section (a)(1).

23        **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

24        *This Act may be cited as the “Review and Evaluation*  
25        *of Strategies for Equitable Reservations for Visitor Experi-*

1   ences Federal Land Act” or the “RESERVE Federal Land

3           (B) *INCLUSIONS.*—The term “Federal res-

4           ervation system” includes reservation, permit,

5           lottery, metering, pricing, merit-based, and other

6           similar management methods via online, tele-

7           phone, paper, in-person, or other methods.

8           (4) *RECREATIONAL ACTIVITY.*—The term “rec-

9           reational activity” includes camping, backpacking,

10          climbing, paddling sports, fishing, hiking, driving,

11          and other recreational opportunities.

12          (5) *SECRETARIES.*—The term “Secretaries”

13          means—

14           (A) the Secretary of the Interior;

15           (B) the Secretary of Agriculture; and

16           (C) the Secretary of the Army, acting

17          through the Chief of Engineers.

18          **SEC. 3. NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES STUDY OF FED-**

19           **ERAL RESERVATION SYSTEMS FOR REC-**

20           **REATIONAL ACTIVITIES ON FEDERAL LAND.**

21          (a) *STUDY.*—

22           (1) *IN GENERAL.*—The Secretaries, acting joint-

23          ly, shall, not later than 60 days after the date of en-

24          actment of this Act, enter into an agreement with the

25          National Academy of Sciences to carry out a study of

1       *Federal reservation systems for recreational activities*  
2       *on Federal land.*

3           (2) *REQUIREMENTS.*—*In carrying out the study*  
4       *under paragraph (1), the National Academy of*  
5       *Sciences shall consult with the Secretaries to carry*  
6       *out the following:*

7           (A) *A review of the history of Federal res-*  
8       *ervation systems, such as recreation.gov, includ-*  
9       *ing a review of—*

10           (i) *the considerations, including data,*  
11       *that led to the establishment of the applica-*  
12       *ble Federal reservation system;*

13           (ii) *the iterations of the applicable*  
14       *Federal reservation system over time to*  
15       *meet the needs of the applicable Federal*  
16       *agency;*

17           (iii) *any visitor feedback provided with*  
18       *respect to the applicable Federal reservation*  
19       *system; and*

20           (iv) *scientific literature or studies ex-*  
21       *amining the efficacy of Federal reservation*  
22       *systems, including user preferences with re-*  
23       *spect to Federal reservation system design*  
24       *and implementation.*

1                   (B) Based on available data and existing  
2 research, answer the following questions:

3                   (i) What are the benefits and challenges of implementing Federal reservation  
4 systems to achieve management goals for  
5 Federal land, including resource protection,  
6 enjoyable visitor experiences, and sustainable  
7 operations and facility use?

8  
9                   (ii) What data are available, and what additional data are needed, to understand  
10 demand for recreation on Federal land? How can the data be used to balance visitor  
11 management and conservation goals?

12  
13                   (iii) What information is available regarding Federal land users and Federal reservation system users? What information is available or needs to be collected regarding demographics and characteristics of successful and unsuccessful applicants using the  
14 Federal reservation systems?

15  
16                   (iv) Do Federal reservation systems pose a barrier for certain communities, including international communities, and user groups to access appropriate recreation

1           *opportunities on Federal land? If so, what  
2           is the nature of any barriers identified?*

3           *(v) What best practices should be con-  
4           sidered in Federal reservation system de-  
5           sign, including visitation management sys-  
6           tem options and booking windows, options  
7           to respond to the needs specific to indi-  
8           vidual Federal land management units, and  
9           equitable access to recreational activities?  
10           What metrics can be used to record out-  
11           comes of Federal reservation system design?*

12           *(vi) How have fees been collected for  
13           Federal reservation systems over time to  
14           meet the needs of the applicable Federal  
15           agency? How are the revenues from fees for  
16           Federal reservation systems split between,  
17           and spent by, Federal land units, Federal  
18           agencies, and third-party contractors? How  
19           is the fee structure disseminated to users?  
20           How could dissemination of information  
21           with respect to the fee structure be im-  
22           proved?*

23           *(vii) What are the odds of success with  
24           respect to securing a reservation under Fed-  
25           eral reservation systems? How are the odds*

1           *of success disseminated to users? How could  
2           dissemination of information with respect  
3           to the odds of success be improved?*

4           *(viii) How are data, including data  
5           collected by contractors, on Federal reserva-  
6           tion systems shared with Federal land man-  
7           agers, researchers, and the public? How can  
8           transparency be improved to inform the de-  
9           cisionmaking of users of Federal reservation  
10          systems?*

11          *(ix) How are Federal reservation sys-  
12          tems incorporating and adapting to emerg-  
13          ing technologies, such as geofencing, bots, or  
14          third-party websites monitoring and resell-  
15          ing reservations? Are Federal reservation  
16          systems resilient to cyber threats?*

17          *(x) How can Federal reservation sys-  
18          tems be improved to reduce “no shows” and  
19          ensure that recreation sites are being used  
20          during periods of high demand? Would an  
21          increase in first-come, first-served opportu-  
22          nities increase equitable access to outdoor  
23          recreation on Federal land?*

24          *(b) REPORT.—The agreement entered into under sub-*  
25          *section (a)(1) shall include a requirement that, not later*

1 than 18 months after the date on which the agreement is  
2 entered into, the National Academy of Sciences shall submit  
3 to the appropriate committees of Congress a report that de-  
4 scribes the results of the study carried out under that sub-  
5 section.

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
