Mr. MERKLEY introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations

A BILL

To authorize the establishment of a Negotiations Support Unit in the Department of State, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. AUTHORITY TO ESTABLISH NEGOTIATIONS
4 SUPPORT UNIT WITHIN DEPARTMENT OF
5 STATE.**

6 (a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con-
7 gress that—

8 (1) there is a need for the United States Gov-
9 ernment to maintain a permanent institutional hub
10 for technical expertise, strategic advice, and knowl-

1 edge management in negotiations, mediation, and
2 peace processes in order to prioritize and invest in
3 diplomacy;

4 (2) the United States plays a unique role in enabling and supporting peace processes and complex
5 political negotiations, the success of which are essential
6 to stability and democracy around the world;

7 (3) the meaningful engagement of conflict-affected
8 communities, particularly women, youth, and
9 other impacted populations, is vital to durable,
10 implementable, and sustainable peace;

11 (4) negotiation requires a specific technical and
12 functional skillset, and thus institutional expertise in
13 this practice area should include trained practitioners
14 and subject matter experts;

15 (5) such skills should continue to be employed
16 as the United States advises and contributes to
17 peace processes, including those where the United
18 States plays a supporting role or is led by multilateral
19 and international partners; and

20 (6) training programs for United States diplomats
21 should draw upon this expertise and United
22 States lessons learned to help equip diplomats with
23 skills to respond to peace processes and complex political
24 negotiations, and how to request support.

1 (b) NEGOTIATIONS SUPPORT UNIT.—Section 1 of the
2 State Department Basic Authorities Act (22 U.S.C.
3 2651a) is amended by adding at the end the following new
4 subsection:

5 “(p) NEGOTIATIONS SUPPORT UNIT.—

6 “(1) AUTHORITY TO ESTABLISH.—The Sec-
7 retary of State may establish within the Department
8 of State a unit to be known as the ‘Negotiations
9 Support Unit’ responsible for carrying out the func-
10 tions described in paragraph (2), as appropriate.

11 “(2) FUNCTIONS.—The functions described in
12 this paragraph are the following:

13 “(A) Serving as a permanent institutional
14 hub and resource for negotiations and peace
15 process expertise and knowledge management.

16 “(B) Advising the Secretary of State, other
17 relevant senior officials, members of the For-
18 eign Service, and employees of the Department
19 of State on the substance, process, and strategy
20 of negotiations, mediation, peace processes, and
21 other complex political negotiations from strat-
22 egy and planning to implementation.

23 “(C) Supporting the development and im-
24 plementation of United States policy related to
25 complex political negotiations and peace proc-

1 esses, including those led by multilateral and
2 international partners.

3 “(D) Advising on mediation and negotia-
4 tions programs to implement United States pol-
5 icy.

6 “(E) Supporting training for Foreign Serv-
7 ices Officers and civil servants on tailored nego-
8 tiation and mediation skills.

9 “(F) Working with other governments,
10 international organizations, and nongovern-
11 mental organizations, as appropriate, to support
12 the development and implementation of United
13 States policy on peace processes and complex
14 political negotiations.

15 “(G) Any additional duties the Secretary
16 of State may prescribe.

17 “(3) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—
18 There is authorized to be appropriated \$5,000,000
19 for the establishment of the Negotiations Support
20 Unit under paragraph (1).”.
