A BILL

To require the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of Health and Human Services to make available to the public on the websites of their respective departments certain information relating to individuals processed through U.S. Customs and Border Protection or Department of Health and Human Services facilities, and for other purposes.

2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Transparency of Mi-
5 gration Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. PUBLIC AVAILABILITY OF INFORMATION RELATING**
2 **TO INDIVIDUALS PROCESSED THROUGH U.S.**
3 **CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTECTION OR DE-**
4 **PARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERV-**
5 **ICES FACILITIES.**

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-
7 rity and the Secretary of Health and Human Services
8 shall make available to the public on the websites of their
9 respective departments’ information described in sub-
10 section (b) relating to individuals unlawfully present in the
11 United States who are—

12 (1) apprehended by U.S. Customs and Border
13 Protection and sent to a federally owned or run de-
14 tention center or released into the United States; or

15 (2) processed through a Department of Health
16 and Human Services facility.

17 (b) INFORMATION DESCRIBED.—Information de-
18 scribed in this subsection is information relating to the
19 following:

20 (1) The daily number of individuals described
21 in subsection (a).

22 (2) The countries of origins of such individuals.

23 (3) The ages and genders of such individuals.

24 (4) The States to which such individuals have
25 been either released or sent.

1 (5) The number and types of criminal convic-
2 tions, if any, such individuals possess.

3 (c) UPDATES.—Information under this section shall
4 be updated weekly.

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
