Mr. FALLON (for himself and Ms. KAPTUR) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform

A BILL

To require the National Cyber Director to submit to Congress a plan to establish an institute within the Federal Government to serve as a centralized resource and training center for Federal cyber workforce development.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Federal Cyber Work-
5 force Training Act of 2025”.

6 **SEC. 2. FEDERAL CYBER WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT IN-**

7 **STITUTE.**

8 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1 (1) AGENCY.—The term “agency” has the
2 meaning given the term in section 551 of title 5,
3 United States Code.

4 (2) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT-
5 TEES.—The term “appropriate congressional com-
6 mittees” means—

7 (A) the Committee on Armed Services of
8 the Senate;

9 (B) the Committee on Homeland Security
10 and Governmental Affairs of the Senate;

11 (C) the Committee on Armed Services of
12 the House of Representatives;

13 (D) the Committee on Homeland Security
14 of the House of Representatives; and

15 (E) the Committee on Oversight and Gov-
16 ernment Reform of the House of Representa-
17 tives.

18 (3) CYBER WORK ROLE.—The term “cyber
19 work role” means—

20 (A) a role indicated in the NICE frame-
21 work for new hires and personnel seeking tran-
22 sition to mid-career positions; and

23 (B) a role relating to work involving de-
24 signing, building, securing, operating, defend-
25 ing, and protecting cyberspace resources.

1 (4) DIRECTOR.—The term “Director” means
2 the National Cyber Director.

3 (5) FEDERAL INSTITUTE.—The term “Federal
4 institute” means the Federal institute described in
5 the plan required under subsection (b)(1).

6 (6) NICE FRAMEWORK.—The term “NICE
7 framework” means Special Publication 800–181 of
8 the National Institute of Standards and Technology
9 entitled “Workforce Framework for Cybersecurity
10 (NICE Framework)”, or any successor document.

11 (7) WORK-BASED LEARNING.—The term “work-
12 based learning” has the meaning given the term in
13 section 3 of the Carl D. Perkins Career and Tech-
14 nical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. 2302).

15 (b) REQUIREMENT.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days
17 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Director,
18 in consultation with the Secretary of Homeland Se-
19 curity, the Secretary of Defense, the Director of the
20 Office of Personnel Management, and the head of
21 any other agency the Director determines necessary,
22 shall submit to Congress and make publicly available
23 a plan for the establishment of a Federal institute
24 to provide—

(A) training for personnel hired for cyber work roles in the Federal Government, including new hires and personnel seeking transition to mid-career positions, which may include upskilling and reskilling efforts; and

(B) training for personnel with responsibilities for human resource functions relating to cyber personnel.

12 (A) provide modularized cyber work role-
13 specific training, including hands-on learning
14 and skill-based assessments, to prepare newly
15 hired Federal personnel from a wide variety of
16 academic and professional backgrounds to per-
17 form effectively in Federal cyber work roles;

24 (i) in accordance with the NICE
25 framework; and

(ii) in consideration of other Federal

cyber training programs;

(C) prioritize entry-level positions in the provision of curriculum development and training;

(D) address the training needs of—

(i) personnel seeking transition to

mid-career positions; and

(ii) personnel with responsibilities for

human resources functions relating to cyber personnel;

(E) include curriculum development and training for Federal cyber workers seeking transition to mid-career positions, which may include upskilling and reskilling efforts;

(F) consider developing a specific module to familiarize and train appropriate Federal Government hiring managers and human resources staff in the unique challenges in recruiting and hiring personnel for Federal cyber workforce roles;

(G) incorporate work-based learning in personnel training;

(H) develop a badging system to communicate qualification and proficiency for individuals

1 uals who successfully complete training through
2 the Federal institute with consideration of sys-
3 tems used by the intelligence community;

4 (I) offer in-person and virtual options to
5 accommodate various learning environments for
6 individuals; and

7 (J) provide training to individuals irrespec-
8 tive of whether an individual has a college de-
9 gree or a college degree in a cyber-related dis-
10 cipline.

11 (3) PLAN ELEMENTS.—The plan required
12 under paragraph (1) shall—

13 (A) recommend an organizational place-
14 ment for the Federal institute, which may in-
15 clude a single agency or a combination of agen-
16 cies;

17 (B) to the greatest extent practicable, align
18 training and tools, including cyber work roles
19 and competencies and the associated tasks,
20 knowledge, and skills from—

21 (i) Special Publication 800–181, Revi-
22 sion 1, of the National Institute of Stand-
23 ards and Technology entitled “National
24 Initiative for Cybersecurity Education

Workforce Framework for Cybersecurity'',

or any successor special publication; or

(ii) other applicable publications, stud-

ies, or guidance of the Federal Govern-

ment;

(C) identify—

(i) elements of the Federal institute

and its functions that could use existing

facilities, resources, and programs of the

Federal Government; and

(ii) elements of the Federal institute

and its functions that would require new

facilities, resources, and programs of the

Federal Government in order to implement

(D) recommend a course curriculum, deliv-

(E) recommend a policy for individuals who do not complete required training;

(F) describe a security clearance process to complete some level of security clearance for appropriate individuals while individuals are enrolled in training;

(G) recommend a governance structure for the Federal institute that would ensure ongoing interagency coordination in the development of a curriculum, the provision of training, and other considerations the Director determines appropriate;

(H) provide an estimate of the funding and new authorities required to establish and operate the Federal institute;

(I) describe any requirements for the Federal institute to conduct work in a classified setting;

(J) identify how the Federal institute would—

(i) provide some or all of the training required by paragraph (1)(A) through 5 academic institutions from among academic institutions that—

(I) are designated by the National Security Agency as a National Center of Academic Excellence in cybersecurity for cyber defense, cyber research, and cyber operations; and

(II) have an operational sensitive compartmented information facility; and

4 (c) BRIEFING.—Not later than 270 days after the
5 date of enactment of this Act, the Director shall provide
6 to the appropriate congressional committees a briefing on
7 the plan required under subsection (b)(1), including an es-
8 timate of the funding and the authorities necessary to im-
9 plement the plan.

10 (d) NO ADDITIONAL FUNDS.—No additional funds
11 are authorized to be appropriated for the purpose of car-
12 rying out this Act.
