Mrs. GILLIBRAND introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

A BILL

To direct the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a study to assess the suitability and feasibility of establishing the African Burial Ground International Memorial Museum and Educational Center at the African Burial Ground National Monument, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “African Burial Ground
5 International Memorial Museum and Educational Center
6 Study Act”.

1 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

2 In this Act:

6 (2) NATIONAL MONUMENT.—The term “Na-
7 tional Monument” means the African Burial Ground
8 National Monument in the city of New York, New
9 York.

13 (4) STATE.—The term “State” means the State
14 of New York.

15 SEC. 3. AFRICAN BURIAL GROUND INTERNATIONAL MEMO-
16 RIAL MUSEUM AND EDUCATIONAL CENTER
17 STUDY.

18 (a) STUDY.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, in consulta-
20 tion with State and local historic preservation offi-
21 cers, State and local historical societies, State and
22 local tourism offices, and other appropriate organiza-
23 tions and government agencies, shall conduct a
24 study to assess the suitability and feasibility of es-
25 tablishing a museum and educational center at the
26 National Monument, to be known as the “African

1 Burial Ground International Memorial Museum and
2 Educational Center”—

3 (A) to serve as a permanent living memo-
4 rial and special tribute—

5 (i) to the enslaved who are buried at
6 the African Burial Ground; and
7 (ii) to other Africans who were
8 enslaved in the United States and other
9 parts of the world;

10 (B) to reflect on the significance of the Af-
11 rican Burial Ground;

12 (C) to examine the African cultural tradi-
13 tions brought to the United States by the
14 enslaved;

15 (D) to explore in-depth the institution of
16 slavery in the United States and other parts of
17 the world;

18 (E) to provide a space for—

19 (i) permanent and temporary exhibits;
20 and

21 (ii) the collection and study of arti-
22 facts and documents;

23 (F) to encourage collaboration between the
24 Museum and the National Museum of African
25 American History and Culture, other museums,

1 historically Black colleges and universities, his-
2 torical societies, educational institutions, and
3 other appropriate entities and organizations,
4 such as the African Burial Ground Memorial
5 Foundation, including collaboration with respect
6 to—
7 (i) the development of cooperative pro-
8 grams and exhibitions, including through
9 digital, electronic, and interactive tech-
10 nologies;
11 (ii) the identification, management,
12 and care of Museum collections; and
13 (iii) the training of Museum and Na-
14 tional Park Service professionals and other
15 persons concerned with heritage preserva-
16 tion; and
17 (G) in addition to any collaboration en-
18 couraged under subparagraph (F), to be associ-
19 ated with the National Museum of African
20 American History and Culture, in a manner to
21 be determined by the Secretary, in consultation
22 with the Board of Regents of the Smithsonian
23 Institution.

1 (2) REQUIREMENTS.—The study conducted
2 under paragraph (1) shall include analysis, docu-
3 mentation, and determinations regarding whether—
4 (A) there is an assemblage of collections to
5 be acquired and housed in the Museum that—
6 (i) represent distinctive aspects of Af-
7 rican cultural traditions brought to the
8 United States by the enslaved;
9 (ii) are worthy of recognition, con-
10 servation, and interpretation;
11 (iii) are important to any identified
12 themes of the Museum;
13 (iv) include DNA samples of well-pre-
14 served human remains that would enable
15 researchers to trace home “roots” in Afri-
16 ca of those individuals buried at the Afri-
17 can Burial Ground; and
18 (v) are unlike any other anthropo-
19 logical collection in other symbolic sites;
20 (B) the Museum provides outstanding op-
21 portunities—
22 (i) to understand how the inter-
23 national slave trade contributed to the Af-
24 rican diaspora;

(ii) to explore in-depth the institution of slavery, as practiced in other parts of the world and in urban, rural, northern, and southern parts of the United States; and

(iii) to help the people of the United States understand the past and honor the history of all people in the United States;

(C) residents, business interests, State and local governments, and nonprofit organizations, such as the African Burial Ground Memorial Foundation—

(i) are involved in the planning of the Museum;

(ii) have developed a conceptual financial plan that outlines the roles of all participants in the Museum, including the Federal Government; and

(iii) have demonstrated support for the designation of the Museum;

(D) the Secretary of the Interior, the Administrator of the General Services Administra-
, or other potential management entities
ld be best suited to operate the Museum;

(E) the public supports the proposed location for the Museum at—

(i) 22 Reade Street, which is adjacent to the National Monument; or

8 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 3 years after the date
9 on which funds are first made available to carry out this
10 Act, the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on En-
11 ergy and Natural Resources of the Senate and the Com-
12 mittee on Natural Resources of the House of Representa-
13 tives a report that describes—

14 (1) the results of the study under subsection
15 (a), including a description of—

16 (A) the availability and cost of collections
17 to be acquired and housed in the Museum;
