A BILL

To terminate the Shelter and Services Program of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “End FEMA Benefits
5 for Illegal Immigrants Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. TERMINATION.**

7 (a) PROHIBITION.—The Administrator of the Federal
8 Emergency Management Agency may not carry out any
9 program to support sheltering and related activities pro-

1 vided by non-Federal entities, including facility improve-
 2 ments and construction, in support of relieving over-
 3 crowding in short-term holding facilities of U.S. Customs
 4 and Border Protection.

5 (b) RESCISSION.—The unobligated balances of the
 6 following amounts are rescinded:

7 (1) The amounts made available and trans-
 8 ferred to the Federal Emergency Management Agen-
 9 cy in the matter under the heading “OPERATIONS
 10 AND SUPPORT” under the heading “U.S. CUSTOMS
 11 AND BORDER PROTECTION” under the heading

 13 TIGATIONS” in title II of division F of the Con-
 14 solidated Appropriations Act of 2023 (Public Law
 15 117–328; 136 Stat. 4730).

 18 cy in the matter under the heading “OPERATIONS
 19 AND SUPPORT” under the heading “U.S. CUSTOMS
 20 AND BORDER PROTECTION” under the heading
 21 “SECURITY, ENFORCEMENT, AND INVES-
 22 TIGATIONS” in title II of division C of the Further
 23 Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2024 (Public Law
 24 118–47; 138 Stat. 598).

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
