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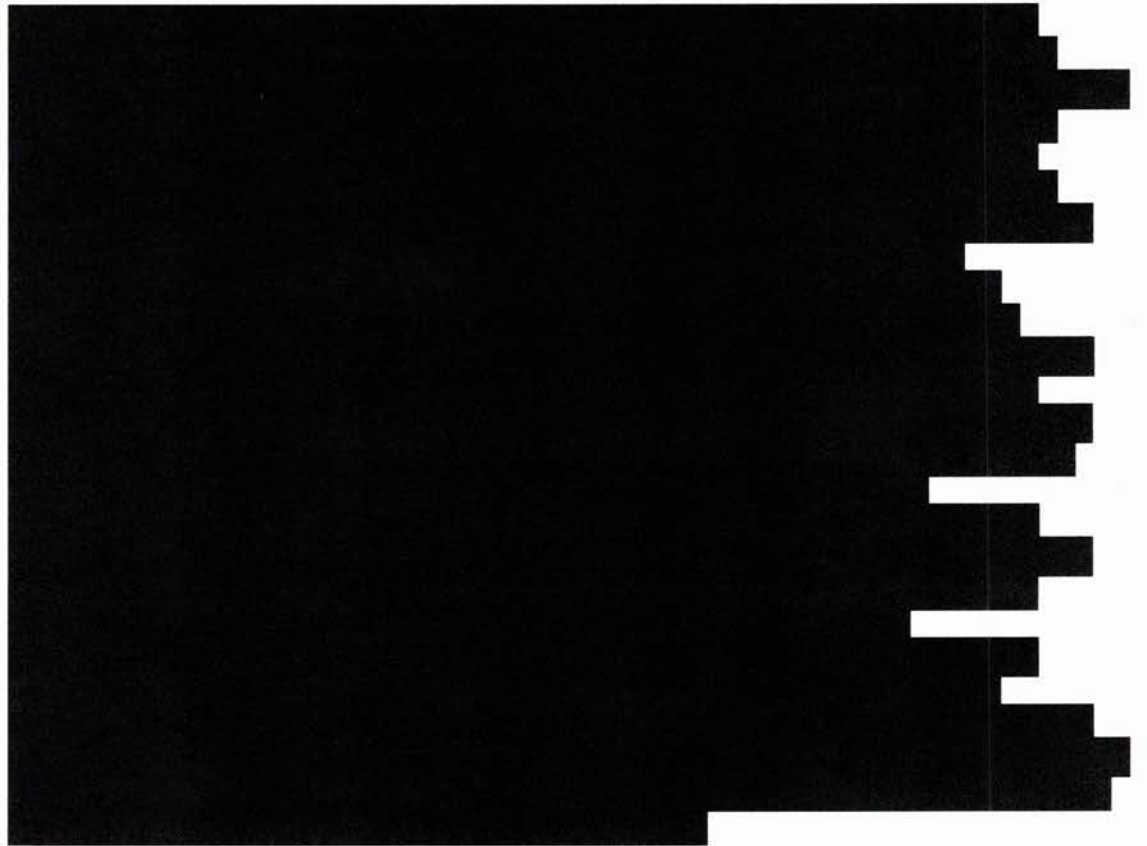
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Staff Present:

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1 THE CHAIRMAN: The committee will come to order.

2 Without objection, the chair may declare a recess at any
3 time.

4 Before we proceed with the business at hand, I recognize
5 the security director for an announcement.

6 [REDACTED]: I just want to remind everyone, if you
7 haven't checked your electronics out front to please do so at
8 this time. That includes cell phones, wearable technology to
9 include fitness trackers, smartwatches, smartrings, wireless
10 headphones, to include AirPods, earbuds, Tile, Airtag and
11 similar tracking devices, key fobs with Bluetooth, laptop and
12 tablets, any device with a camera, Bluetooth, WiFi or a
13 microphone.

14 Thank you.

15 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you, [REDACTED].

16 First, I would like to welcome everyone to today's
17 markup and thank all the members, and particularly the staff,
18 who worked incredibly hard and for long hours to reach the
19 point we are at today.

20 The committee will now turn to the legislative business
21 at hand, the markup of H.R. 5167, the Intelligence
22 Authorization Act for fiscal year 2026. As a reminder, this
23 markup is currently proceeding in an open session. If any
24 member has a classified narrative that requires the committee
25 to enter closed session, we need to vote in order to do so.

1 I ask that members bring to the chair's intention their
2 intention to seek recognition for classified matters. And we
3 will postpone such discussion until the committee has
4 concluded unclassified business so that all classified
5 matters can be discussed together if we proceed to closed
6 session.

7 Pursuant to committee rule 7(h), any recorded votes will
8 be postponed until the completion of consideration of the
9 legislative text in any amendments.

10 Objection, so ordered.

11 The Intelligence Authorization Act provides the legal
12 authorities and funding authorizations for the work of
13 America's intelligence agencies. The bill before us, along
14 with the classified schedules of authorizations and
15 classified annex, describe in detail actions with respect to
16 the President's fiscal year 2026 budget request for the
17 National Intelligence Program, Military Intelligence Program
18 and Information Systems Security Program.

19 This annual legislation is the mechanism by which
20 Congress, the representatives of the American people exercise
21 our constitutional prerogatives related to the Intelligence
22 Community.

23 While much of the work rightly remains behind the scenes
24 to protect the sources and methods, it is vital oversight for
25 the American people.

1 Today's bill includes a myriad of provisions
2 representing key priorities of both the majority and
3 minority, as well as fully bipartisan actions. Of utmost
4 importance, though, is the first major reform Congress has
5 pursued of our Nation's counterintelligence posture in over
6 two decades. This is far too long as foreign intelligence
7 threat to the United States, particularly in the homeland,
8 has evolved and expanded in ways that we never could have
9 anticipated even a few years ago, let alone two decades.

10 While our adversaries in the Chinese Communist Party,
11 Russia, Iran and terrorist groups operate on a war footing
12 against the United States, too often we have remained
13 reactive, complacent and risk-averse. This is the opinion
14 many of the amazing patriots in the FBI, military, defense CI
15 organizations, CIA, NSA and others in the CI trenches. I
16 thank those brave Americans for their service and hope
17 today's bill will further integrate their efforts to ensure
18 we are bringing all our capabilities to the table.

19 Additionally, today's bill is the first set of actions
20 taken by the committee since the establishment of our new
21 subcommittee, the Subcommittee on Open Source Intelligence.
22 This is provisions will set a strong framework for the
23 Intelligence Community to begin ensuring the United States
24 leverages this incredible tool while also setting necessary
25 and appropriate guardrails.

1 Finally, our bill deals with many issues the
2 Intelligence Community, our Nation and the free world must
3 engage with, from biosecurity challenges to artificial
4 intelligence. We must ensure our Nation's Intelligence
5 Community is prepared to enable the elected leaders of the
6 United States in dangerous times.

7 I thank Ranking Member Himes for his partnership as we
8 work through complex issues to better protect our country.

9 And I will now yield to the ranking member for any
10 comments he would like to make.

11 MR. HIMES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

12 The IAA is the single most critical tool in our
13 oversight toolkit. It includes hundreds of provisions
14 between the bill text classified annex and committee report
15 that inform our oversight of the IC and give our oversight
16 teeth. That is why it is so critical that we work in a
17 bipartisan fashion not only to craft the IAA, but to achieve
18 its enactment into law each year.

19 The 2026 IAA reflects the bipartisan efforts of members
20 and staff to fashion a bill that deserves support from all
21 HPSCI members today, not because it is a perfect product or
22 exactly what I would have written if we held the majority,
23 but because it is a serious effort to improve our oversight
24 of the IC and improve how the IC does its job is in a variety
25 of areas. In our highly politicized environment, this is no

1 easy task, and I truly appreciate the efforts of chairman,
2 all members and the staff have undertaken to work
3 constructive manner.

4 We are taking up this legislation at a moment when at
5 least on my side of the aisle we have very significant
6 concerns with some actions that have been taken by the
7 administration and by the leadership of the IC, particularly
8 Director Gabbard. During open session I would point to
9 actions like the revocation of security clearance of public
10 servants, the firing of IC leaders without explanation, and
11 the politicization of intelligence analysis in the guise of
12 depoliticizing intelligence analysis of areas of broad
13 concern to the minority members of this committee, and I am
14 naive enough to believe, of concern to all Members of
15 Congress, regardless of party.

16 The IC is a national treasure that transcends
17 Presidential administrations. Preserving and protecting its
18 ability to collect and analyze intelligence in a way that no
19 other country in the world can match is critical to our
20 national security.

21 So for that reason, minority members will be offering
22 amendments to both the bill text and the annex during this
23 markup. We have drafted those amendments not to score
24 political points, but to close real gaps we see in this
25 committee's oversight. And I hope the majority will receive

1 them in that spirit.

2 With that said, I plan to support the bill, both because
3 I believe it is critical to keep this process moving forward,
4 and because the bill and annex contain meaningful and
5 important proposals to strengthen our oversight and our
6 security.

7 To briefly touch on a few portions of the bill, the
8 chairman's mark concludes significant bipartisan reforms to
9 accelerate the IC's adoption of AI. The technology is
10 already transforming the practice of intelligence collection
11 and analysis. It includes bipartisan reforms around open
12 source intelligence -- a big thank you to the subcommittee
13 which is doing such good work in that area. Building on the
14 oversight conducted by that committee to protect resources
15 for OSINT and make the most effective possible use of open
16 source data.

17 The bill also continues the committee's focus on
18 technology adoption, an area of real concern for me. Among
19 other provisions, it enhances acquisition authorities to cut
20 red tape, it designates a lead official at agencies to focus
21 on biotechnology and it supports the IC innovation unit as a
22 vehicle for rapid adoption of leading technology.

23 Finally, I would just briefly mention that the
24 significant counterintelligence reforms authored by the
25 chairman and contained in Title 3 of this bill. I have had

1 this discussion with the chairman and I think he's absolutely
2 right that we have shortcomings in the CI mission space and
3 there are good reasons to wonder if the current structure
4 around CI is the optimal one for protecting Americans
5 encountering threats. I know this will not be the last word
6 on the matter. I know we are still trying get our heads
7 around it. But as we head to conference, I am committed to
8 working with the chairman, all members, as well as
9 stakeholders across the executive branch to understand the
10 impact of these changes and to make sure we get it right.

11 Once again, I want to extend my appreciation to all
12 members and staff who have contributed to this bill, which I
13 plan to support today.

14 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I yield back.

15 THE CHAIRMAN: I thank the gentleman.

16 And pursuant to notice, I now call up H.R. 5167, the
17 Intelligence Authorization Act for fiscal year 2026. The
18 clerk shall report the title of the bill.

19 THE CLERK: H.R. 5167, the Intelligence Authorization
20 Act for fiscal year 2026.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: Without objection, the first reading of
22 the bill is dispensed with and the bill is open to amendment
23 at any point.

24 I will now offer an amendment in the nature of a
25 substitute clerk which members have before them.

1 The clerk will designate the amendment.

2 THE CLERK: An amendment in the nature of a substitute
3 offered by Chairman Rick Crawford of Arkansas.

4 THE CHAIRMAN: Without objection, the reading of the
5 amendment is dispensed with.

6 This amendment reflects bipartisan provisions consisting
7 of unclassified legislative text and a classified schedule of
8 authorizations for fiscal year 2026, which the legislative
9 text incorporates by reference.

10 This amendment incorporates the priorities of the
11 committee leadership, as well as the substantive bipartisan
12 work of six subcommittees. I ask for unanimous consent that
13 the amendment in the nature of a substitute be considered as
14 base text for the H.R. 5167, the Intelligence Authorization
15 Act for fiscal year 2026.

16 Without objection, so ordered.

17 At this time, does any member wish to be recognized on
18 the legislative text either for discussion or amendment in
19 this unclassified setting?

20 If there is no further discussion or amendment on the
21 unclassified legislative text, this portion of the meeting --

22 I now recognize Mr. Fitzpatrick for an amendment.

23 MR. FITZPATRICK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have an
24 amendment.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will report the amendment.

1 Amendment number 1, Mr. Fitzpatrick.

2 And we will now distribute the amendment.

3 THE CLERK: Amendment number 1, intelligence support for
4 Ukraine.

5 [The amendment of Mr. Fitzpatrick can be found in the
6 Appendix on page ?.]

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1 THE CHAIRMAN: Thank you. The amendment is now being
2 distributed.

3 Mr. Fitzpatrick you are recognized for 5 minutes.

4 MR. FITZPATRICK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Very, very
5 brief and straightforward. This amendment requires the
6 Director of National Intelligence ensure that each agency
7 head of the relevant element of the Intelligence Community
8 provide the government of Ukraine intelligence support,
9 including information intelligence and imagery collection,
10 which would be sufficient to support and enable robust
11 operations of the government of Ukraine that are specifically
12 intended or reasonably expected to defend and/or retake
13 territory of Ukraine from the Russian Federation.

14 THE CHAIRMAN: Is there any debate on the amendment?

15 MR. STEUBE: Can we ask questions of the sponsor?

16 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Steube.

17 MR. STEUBE: Just a friendly inquiry so what, other than
18 Five Eyes countries, what other countries would we have in
19 law that we are going to share intelligence with and not give
20 that authority to the President and DNI?

21 MR. FITZPATRICK: Well, this is specifically the
22 discretion of DNI to share intelligence with Ukraine in order
23 to support their operations. If this amendment was adopted
24 it doesn't give them discretion, it tells them we are going
25 to share.

1 MR. FITZPATRICK: It does give discretion. It is as
2 determined by the Director of DNI.

3 MR. STEUBE: Okay. But is there other countries that we
4 have this in law arrangement with?

5 MR. FITZPATRICK: I am only offering it for this. I am
6 not aware of that arrangement for others.

7 MR. STEUBE: Okay, I yield back.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

9 Do any other members wish to be recognized on this
10 amendment?

11 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment.

12 All those in favor say aye.

13 Those opposed, no.

14 In the opinion, of the chair the ayes have it. The
15 amendment is agreed to.

16 I now recognize Ms. Houlahan for an agreement.

17 MR. PERRY: Mr. Chair, are you going to call a recorded
18 vote?

19 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Perry.

20 MR. PERRY: I request a recorded vote.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Perry has requested a recorded vote.
22 A recorded vote has been requested. All votes will be rolled
23 to the end of the proceeding.

24 MR. PERRY: Mr. Chairman, I withdraw my request.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Perry withdraws the request for a

1 recorded vote.

2 The amendment is agreed to.

3 Ms. Houlahan.

4 MS. HOULAHAN: Do I begin before it is passed out or do
5 I go ahead and start?

6 THE CHAIRMAN: You have an amendment?

7 MS. HOULAHAN: Mr. Chair, I have an amendment.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. The clerk will report the
9 amendment.

10 THE CLERK: Amendment number 1 offered by Ms. Houlahan.

11 [The amendment of Ms. Houlahan can be found in the
12 Appendix on page ?.]

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1 THE CHAIRMAN: Amendment number 2 by Ms. Houlahan is
2 being offered and distributed.

3 Ms. Houlahan, you are recognized for 5 minutes to
4 explain your amendment.

5 MS. HOULAHAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. This amendment,
6 my amendment would require the inspector general of the
7 Intelligence Community to conduct an inquiry into the facts
8 and into the circumstances surrounding DNI Gabbard's recent
9 decision to revoke the security clearances of 37 current and
10 former U.S. government officials.

11 Director Gabbard made blanket accusations of wrongdoing
12 against these officials who, according to public reporting,
13 included key current officials at CIA, NSA and NGA, as well
14 as at least two congressional staffers. But the Director
15 provided no individualized evidence to support any allegation
16 that was made against these public servants.

17 Earlier this week, HPSCI Democrats sent Director Gabbard
18 a letter that seeks precisely this information. If passed
19 this prologue we will likely receive no meaningful response
20 to our legitimate oversight inquiry. And this leaves us no
21 choice of even to offer this amendment.

22 We cannot lose our capacity for alarm or outrage just
23 because we have been numbed by so much curious and
24 questionable behavior on the part of the DNI. It is for that
25 reason that I submit this amendment and would ask that my

1 colleagues consider it favorably.

2 I yield back.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentlewoman yields. Does anyone seek
4 time and opposition? Mr. Jackson is recognized.

5 DR. JACKSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

6 The DNI has explained this. And just to start with,
7 what I would like to do is I would like just to read from the
8 memo here from the Director of National Intelligence. This
9 is from the Director of National Intelligence, it references
10 the executive order 13526, classified national security
11 information dated 29 December 2009, signed by President
12 Barack Obama. The memo says, The U.S. Government security
13 clearance system exists to protect classified national
14 security information and to ensure that those entrusted with
15 access to our Nation's most sensitive information uphold the
16 highest standards of integrity, objectivity, and stewardship.

17 It is the determination of this office that certain
18 individuals, these 37 individuals, have engaged in some or
19 all of the following conduct undermining those standards to
20 include politicization and weaponization of intelligence to
21 advance personal partisan or non objective agendas
22 inconsistent with the national security priorities.

23 Failure to safeguard classified information in
24 accordance with the applicable laws, regulations and agency
25 policies, failure to adhere to professional analytic

1 tradecraft standards and other conduct detrimental to the
2 trust and confidence required for our continued access to
3 national security information.

4 The President has directed effective and immediately --
5 as directed that effective immediately, the security
6 clearances of the following 37 individuals are revoked. It
7 goes on to list them and after it says Intelligence Community
8 professionals must remain nonpartisan fact driven and
9 committed to the truth above all else. All personnel are
10 reminded that holding a clearance is a privilege, not a right
11 and this privilege is contingent upon the continued adherence
12 to the principles and responsibilities of our profession.
13 Any betrayal of these standards compromises not only our
14 mission, but also the safety and security of the American
15 people.

16 The DNI spokesperson has confirmed that the relevant
17 agencies were also notified of these revocations and no
18 covert officers were exposed. The media referred to the
19 individuals who lost their security clearance one of them as
20 undercover. The reality is that this individual is widely
21 known as a public figure who for years has utilized their IC
22 credentials to garner speaking engagements, publication of
23 articles, positions with organizations such as the Carnegie
24 Endowment for International Peace. It is not clear what the
25 proposed IG report would accomplish. I don't find any

1 requirement anywhere for the President of the United States
2 to be restricted in his ability to make these decisions. Is
3 the inspector general supposed to review all of the officer's
4 files to see if he would have balanced concerns about
5 national security differently? I do not think that that is
6 his job.

7 What standards would the IG use? How much time would be
8 diverted from critical oversight functions? I wish to point
9 out that when a Democrat President was in power, some of my
10 Democrat colleagues were not supportive of whistleblowers who
11 reported that their security clearances were revoked in
12 retaliation for exposing wrongdoing. I think we need one
13 standard for oversight regardless of the political party that
14 is in charge. I understand the chairman is planning a markup
15 on a bill to enhance oversight of the Intelligence Community.
16 I look forward to that separate markup and a chance to
17 further discuss this issue at any further date. I plan to
18 vote no on this amendment and I urge all of my colleagues do
19 the same.

20 I yield back.

21 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields. Does anybody else
22 seek recognition?

23 MS. HOULAHAN: I would love to talk a little bit more.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: Someone is going to have to seek rec --
25 okay, Mr. Himes.

1 MR. HIMES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2 I would just point out everything Mr. Jackson said is
3 true, but the definition of oversight is that we trust but
4 verify. We have been told, and Mr. Jackson read the memo,
5 that there was politicization, that there was cause.
6 Oversight means we confirmed that. And Ms. Houlihan's
7 amendment is without prejudice -- by the way, my letter to
8 the DNI was without prejudice. It just said, you took a
9 pretty significant action here, show us the backing.

10 By the way, if the backing shows that what the memo that
11 Mr. Jackson read is true, I will be the first to go in front
12 of the cameras to say that that, this is neutral oversight.
13 I would suggest to my friends in the majority that if the
14 circumstances were reversed and a democratic President had
15 done this you would have offered precisely this amendment.

16 And I yield my time to Ms. Houlihan.

17 MS. HOULAHAN: Thank you, Mr. Himes.

18 I want to reiterate exactly what he said, the inspector
19 general's job it is not a waste of time for him to actually
20 do an investigation that is asked for by the Congress. This
21 is indeed exactly what the job of inspector general is,
22 oversight is also exactly our job. This is not meant to be a
23 partisan conversation. If there are things to understand
24 about these 37 individuals within the purview of this
25 organization, of this committee, then that should happen. I

1 am not looking for this to be a public conversation. I am
2 looking to understand policy and procedure and make sure that
3 it is being implemented correctly.

4 With that, I yield and thank you for the time.

5 THE CHAIRMAN: Any other members wish to seek
6 recognition?

7 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment.

8 The chairman tends to vote no.

9 All those in favor, say aye.

10 All those opposed, no.

11 In the opinion of the chair, the noes have it.

12 MS. HOULAHAN: Mr. Chairman, I ask for a recorded vote.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: A recorded vote is requested. That will
14 be rolled to the end of the proceeding.

15 Mr. Perry:

16 MR. PERRY: Mr. Chairman, I have an amendment at the
17 desk.

18 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will report the amendment.

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1 THE CLERK: Amendment number 3, requirement to purge
2 incidentally collected publicly available information or
3 commercially available information relating to United States
4 persons.

5 THE CHAIRMAN: The amendment is being distributed. The
6 gentleman from Pennsylvania is recognized for 5 minutes to
7 explain his amendment.

8 MR. PERRY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

9 Constitutional protections for privacy and publicly or
10 commercially available information are extremely limited,
11 largely because there is no reasonable expectation of privacy
12 for information voluntarily shared with third parties, such
13 as digital services. Now data brokers collect and aggregate
14 vast amounts of personal information from countless digital
15 sources, which are then sold or shared with both private
16 companies and government agencies.

17 The committee has shown foresight in establishing an
18 OSINT subcommittee to elevate open source as a primary
19 discipline. However, as we address duplicative purchases, we
20 must also confront the fact that intelligence agencies
21 lacking clear CAI policies often fail to track their usage,
22 cannot accurately determine how much information they
23 purchase and may incidentally retain U.S. person data.

24 In the absence of a comprehensive Federal privacy law,
25 it is our duty as members of the Intelligence Committee, and

1 as lawmakers, to uphold the principle that our intelligence
2 agencies must not spy on Americans. Supporting the effective
3 and efficient use of OSINT from publicly and commercially
4 available sources must go hand in hand with strong safeguards
5 to protect U.S. persons' data and privacy. This amendment
6 requires all elements of the Intelligence Community to purge
7 any U.S. person data that it incidentally collected from
8 publicly or commercially available information. And with
9 that I urge adoption.

10 I yield the balance, Mr. Chairman.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

12 Does any member seek recognition on this amendment? Mr.
13 Himes.

14 MR. HIMES: I move to strike the last word.

15 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Himes.

16 MR. HIMES: I agree that we need the IC to be
17 laser-focused on how it handles U.S. person information so I
18 support the amendment's intent. It is true that publicly and
19 commercially available information are special categories
20 that by their nature present more complications with respect
21 to U.S. person data than the clandestinely acquired types of
22 intelligence.

23 We should also recognize that the IC already understands
24 that this type of open-source information requires additional
25 consideration as evidenced by the quote commercially

1 available information framework that ODNI issued last year
2 and explicitly calls for additional protections and
3 safeguards for sensitive CAI derived from commercial data
4 sets likely to contain substantial volumes of U.S. person
5 PII. So we have a lot of work to do here and I appreciate
6 Mr. Perry's efforts to get that started.

7 If this amendment is adopted, I will advocate that we
8 seek views from the IC and other stakeholders during
9 conference about how this provision interplays with existing
10 IC regulations and policies for U.S. person information and
11 open source to ensure that we strike the right balance. I do
12 not oppose the amendment.

13 And I yield back.

14 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields. Are there any
15 other members that seek recognition?

16 MR. CROW: Mr. Chairman.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Crow.

18 MR. CROW: Yeah, I just have a question for Mr. Perry.
19 I am curious, I truly don't know this the answer to this, I
20 am curious whether this could have any impact on FISA 702
21 authorities. Like, would the definition of incidental
22 collection impact the database that we use for collections
23 and searches under that authority?

24 MR. PERRY: It doesn't prescribe -- the amendment
25 doesn't prescribe a manner or a time, so I see no impact to

1 702. At this point, it leaves it up to the agency to handle
2 the administrative function. It just makes sure that they
3 know that they have a responsibility and a requirement to
4 purge any incidental collection of American citizens' data.

5 MR. CROW: Okay.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

7 Do any other members wish to be recognized?

8 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment, the
9 chairman supports.

10 All those in favor, say aye.

11 All those opposed, no.

12 In the opinion of the chair, the ayes have it. The
13 amendment is agreed to.

14 Mr. Krishnamoorthi.

15 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman I have an
16 amendment at the desk.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will report the amendment.

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1 THE CLERK: Amendment number 4, notice of the removal of
2 the head of an element of the Intelligence Community.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: The amendment is being distributed.

4 Mr. Krishnamoorthi, you are recognized for 5 minutes to
5 explain your amendment.

6 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

7 This amendment speaks directly to core oversight, and
8 would ensure that our committee receives immediate
9 substantive notification from the President when he
10 terminates the head of an Intelligence Community element.

11 In early April, President Trump fired the director of
12 NSA and several weeks ago did the same to the DIA director.
13 And to this day, as far as I am aware, the committee had has
14 received no meaningful explanation from the executive branch
15 about why these career, Senate-confirmed officials were
16 suddenly terminated.

17 To address this apparent disregard for keeping the
18 committee fully and currently informed about such personnel
19 moves in future, this straightforward amendment requires the
20 President to furnish the substantive rationale, including
21 case-specific reasons to the committee no later than 24 hours
22 after firing the head of an IC element. Without sufficiently
23 understanding of the President's justification for taking
24 such actions, our committee is left in the dark about
25 decisions affecting some of the most important national

1 security leadership roles in our government. I urge my
2 colleagues to vote yes on this amendment.

3 And I yield back.

4 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

5 Does any member seek recognition? Mr. Kelly.

6 MR. KELLY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I seek -- I rise
7 in opposition to this amendment. This amendment would
8 require the President provide written notices within 24 hours
9 of the substantive rationale, including detailed and
10 case-specific reasons for the removal of the head of an IC
11 element.

12 As our minority colleagues well know, the President is
13 in charge of the executive branch. And any head of an IC
14 elements serves at the discretion of the President. It is
15 micromanagement to an unreasonable degree to require written
16 notice detailing the President's rationale and case specific
17 reasons for the removal of any official. We already receive
18 notice when these actions occur. The minority may not like
19 when officials are removed from duty, but that doesn't change
20 the fact that it is the President's prerogative to decide who
21 will lead any element of the IC agency. Therefore, I will
22 vote no on this amendment and I urge my colleagues to do the
23 same.

24 And with that, Mr. Chairman, I yield back.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

1 Does any other member seek recognition?

2 Mr. Crow.

3 MR. CROW: Yeah, I would support this amendment as very
4 reasonable, appropriate oversight within the jurisdiction of
5 this committee.

6 And you know, to the gentleman from Mississippi's point,
7 we are not saying that the President doesn't have the
8 prerogative, this amendment, as I understand it, doesn't say
9 this that the President doesn't have the authority to remove.
10 It simply says, we want to know about it, right? And there
11 are numerous examples of this committee asking about
12 personnel issues, weighing in on personnel issues,
13 questioning under the last administration personnel issues.
14 I fact, remember a lot of debate about General Nakasone, and
15 whether or not he was competent enough to lead the agency in
16 question. And we had lot of discussion about that as a
17 committee under the last administration. I just think it
18 this is very reasonable and falls directly within the
19 wheelhouse of what we should be doing, again not restricting
20 the administration, but giving us the information to actually
21 have the debate and weigh in on important decisions.

22 THE CHAIRMAN: Any other members seek recognition? Get
23 somebody to yield to you, Raja.

24 MR. CROW: I will give my remaining time to
25 Mr. Krishnamoorthi.

1 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: How much time do I have?

2 THE CHAIRMAN: 3 minutes.

3 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Okay, that is probably enough.

4 MR. CROW: I give only a minute to Mr. Krishnamoorthi.

5 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Hold on a second. Same team, man.
6 What is going on?

7 MR. CROW: I am kidding. He can have my remaining time.

8 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Hey, Mr. Kelly, I respect your
9 comments, but let's just take the example of Lieutenant
10 General Kruse, who I believe was the head of DIA, we all know
11 him. He has been before our committee numerous times -- one
12 of the most kind of able people that I have encountered in
13 this committee, leading any Intelligence Committee element --
14 and he was dismissed without any explanation, certainly not
15 any notice to us beforehand. And all we are asking here is
16 not even notice beforehand, but notice after the fact. Like,
17 an explanation of why after the fact, because these people
18 are incredibly talented, some of the best and the brightest
19 that we have. And so, I am just concerned when they are
20 dismissed for no reason or for reasons having nothing to do
21 with merit and we need to understand that. And I don't care
22 which President it is, I don't care which party, we should
23 have that ability to understand so we can perform our
24 oversight. Thank you.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

1 Do any other members seek recognition?

2 I will recognize myself for a quick minute before we
3 vote on this. I can tell you that I probably had occasion to
4 interact with General Kruse more than anybody on this
5 committee in the course of the investigation that I was
6 conducting in the last Congress. And I can tell you that I
7 recommended then and I recommended to this President that he
8 be removed for cause. Cause I am happy to discuss with any
9 of you maybe under other circumstances, but his treatment of
10 AHI victims to me was sufficient cause to have him removed
11 from that position. And so after the fact I get the
12 concerns, I understand that, but in the end the President,
13 his prerogative to exercise that decision and his judgment.
14 So for that reason I oppose this amendment.

15 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Mr. Crawford, could I get 2
16 seconds, 2 seconds?

17 THE CHAIRMAN: Sure.

18 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: Even if you or they had explained
19 that to us after the fact, that would be something and that
20 would have been a good exp -- that would have been an
21 explanation, but without any we are just left to speculate.

22 THE CHAIRMAN: I gotcha, I understand that.

23 Does anybody else seek recognition?

24 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment. The
25 chairman intends to vote no.

1 All those in favor, say aye.

2 All those opposed, no.

3 In the opinion of the chair, the noes have it.

4 MR. KRISHNAMOORTHY: I want a recorded vote.

5 THE CHAIRMAN: And a recorded vote is requested. That
6 will be postponed until the end of the proceeding.

7 Ms. Houlihan.

8 MS. HOULAHAN: Mr. Chair, I have an amendment at the
9 desk.

10 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will report the amendment.

11 THE CLERK: Amendment number 5, uniformed minimum
12 requirements for access to classified information offered by
13 Ms. Houlihan.

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1 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will distribute the amendment.
2 Ms. Houlahan, you are recognized for 5 minutes to explain
3 your amendment.

4 MS. HOULAHAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

5 This amendment will establish that the DNI as the
6 President's designated overseer for security clearance
7 matters has a statutory obligation to ensure that security
8 clearances are only issued to individuals who have met the
9 uniform minimum requirements, as promulgated by the President
10 to receive access to classified information. This would also
11 require that the DNI be made aware when a Federal agency had
12 issues a waiver to those uniformed minimum requirements, and
13 to cite the national security imperative that is there for
14 doing so. Simply put, this amendment builds on existing laws
15 requiring that the President establish procedures surrounding
16 when individuals are given temporary access to classified
17 information, and for the DNI to oversee agencies compliance
18 with those procedures.

19 It, therefore, addresses a matter that I feel is among
20 the committee's most important responsibilities, oversight of
21 who in our government obtains access to classified national
22 security information and how that access is granted.

23 In the early days of this administration, reports about
24 Elon Musk and his DOGE associates gaining access to
25 government facilities and sensitive data fueled very serious

1 concerns about the standards and transparency around which
2 individuals were receiving temporary security clearances, or
3 were being granted access to classified information without
4 having gone through the longstanding clearance process.

5 When I was a young lieutenant, it took me over a year to
6 get the grants and clearances that apparently Elon Musk and
7 his associates got with just a temporary waiver.

8 If nothing else, this committee needs transparency.
9 When individuals are granted clearances without undergoing
10 full investigation, or accessing classified information
11 pursuant a waiver granted by any agency head. It should
12 stand to reason that the circumstances necessitating a
13 temporary clearance should be very rare and have demonstrable
14 national security basis.

15 Finally and critically, this amendment ensures that the
16 committee remains informed, every step of the way, and in a
17 timely fashion so that we know who is gaining access to
18 classified information outside of the established processes
19 and channels and why.

20 So to reiterate, under this amendment the President and
21 DNI define what the minimum standards are for a clearance.
22 My proposal simply ensures that those obtaining access to our
23 Nation's secrets actually meet those standards. I urge my
24 colleagues to vote yes on this very straightforward and
25 commonsense amendment which is just simply our job.

1 And with that, I yield back. Thank you.

2 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentlewoman yields.

3 Does any member seek recognition? Ms. Tenney is
4 recognized.

5 MS. TENNEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I obviously want
6 to speak in opposition to this amendment, and I thank you.

7 This proposed amendment covers security clearances for
8 current and former executive employees, Article II employees,
9 not Congress Members and staff, Article I or Federal judges
10 under Article III. The amendment purports to tell the
11 President what factors he and his designee may consider when
12 granting security clearances, one. And also tells the
13 President what process he or his designee must use to grant a
14 security clearance.

15 The Supreme Court has indicated this rule -- this rule
16 is unconstitutional. I would cite and I have the entire
17 abstract of this, the Department of Navy v. Egan decision in
18 1988 by Justice Blackmun. The Supreme Court held that the
19 Constitution vests the President with, and I quote from the
20 case directly, authority to classify and control access to
21 information bearing on national security and to determine
22 whether with an individual is sufficiently trustworthy to
23 occupy a position in the executive branch that will give that
24 person access to such information.

25 The Supreme Court further explained that the President's

1 power to grant or revoke security clearances for individuals
2 outside of Congress or the judiciary derives from the
3 Constitution, and such a decision is committed by law to the
4 executive branch.

5 Additionally, I wanted to say it is not clear that the
6 proposed reporting requirement would accomplish. Do we, as
7 members of the Intelligence Committee, have to get engaged
8 with us and provide the information and review it? Is the
9 committee supposed to know what national security issues the
10 President is considering? Again, we are moving into the
11 territory, much like Mr. Krishnamoorthi, the last amendment
12 moving into the territory of invading the Article II powers
13 of the executive. And I agree that the congressional
14 intelligence committees and inspector generals do have a role
15 in providing oversight of the security clearance process in
16 certain circumstances, of course. But I don't believe that
17 this role is to micromanage the process. The Constitution
18 leads to the President.

19 And this is expressed and there are a lot of famous
20 cases cited in this case. And I will just throw it out some
21 names, Haig, Nixon, Schlesinger, this has been reviewed
22 multiple times by the U.S. Supreme Court and the Article II
23 powers of the President to do that. So I believe the
24 appropriate role of Congress is to ensure that whistleblowers
25 -- and that is something we are going to be talking about --

1 are comfortable coming forward to the congressional oversight
2 committees and the inspector general.

3 I understand Chairman Crawford is going to be planning a
4 markup for the legislation to protect whistleblowers and
5 create an independent general -- inspector general of the
6 Intelligence Community to ensure that these types of claims
7 are reviewed without bias and delay. And I think that would
8 be a very productive move. So, I look forward to that
9 markup. I think it is important, but again, we are going
10 into Article II territory where the President has under
11 well-established law and constitutional statutory law and
12 through the U.S. Supreme Court over the years. So I will
13 vote no on this amendment. And I encourage my colleagues to
14 do that for the sake of balance of powers here.

15 I yield back.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentlewoman yields.

17 Mr. Quigley.

18 MR. QUIGLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Sometimes we are
19 Federalists, sometimes we are not. Sometimes we are for
20 State's rights, sometimes we are not. As this President does
21 an unprecedented attack on our Article I powers, not the
22 least of which are appropriations, tariffs, the list goes on
23 and on. All of a sudden, we are the policemen protecting
24 those specific silos, Article I, Article II.

25 With all due respect, you seem a lot more concerned

1 about protecting Article II for the President than Article I
2 for us first in the Constitution, with the realization that
3 the Founding Fathers recognize there was a need for the
4 legislative body coming from the people at the time directly
5 in a larger number, having more supreme powers. But I get
6 it, it is a matter of convenience here. There is a
7 separation of powers, but those are a separation of shared
8 powers and I think we know what we are talking about here.
9 That is why we have oversight over the executive branch,
10 because they don't have unlimited power, neither do we. So I
11 think what this amendment is getting to is recognizing that
12 just because have you authorization and that you have
13 oversight over some of these powers it doesn't mean that the
14 President's giving them up.

15 MS. TENNEY: Will the gentleman yield?

16 MR. QUIGLEY: So let's at least try to be -- no. Let's
17 at least try to be consistent.

18 MS. TENNEY: Would the gentleman yield?

19 MR. QUIGLEY: I yield back.

20 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields his time.
21 Mr. Steube.

22 MR. STEUBE: I yield to Mrs. Tenney.

23 MS. TENNEY: Thank you, Mr. Steube.

24 THE CHAIRMAN: Ms. Tenney is recognized.

25 MS. TENNEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

1 I just want to point out that we are Federalists, we
2 believe in the separation of powers. But our mission here
3 and our limit is to look at the law as it relates to
4 oversight and our laws it relates to interpreting the
5 Constitution and the Supreme Court decisions based on Article
6 II powers.

7 When we had a Democrat President in power, there was no
8 interest in protecting whistleblowers, for example.
9 Whistleblowers who claimed their executive branch privileges
10 were revoked. And there was no attempt to try to help them
11 out. We had whistleblowers that came into the Ways and Means
12 Committee, a different committee than the Oversight -- the
13 intelligence committee. And those whistleblowers were also
14 condemned by Democrats and this administration -- the former
15 administration.

16 So I think what we are trying to do to protect
17 whistleblowers is a different space than we are talking about
18 the President and whether you disagree with the President and
19 what he is doing on tariffs or whatever else, that is the
20 province of another committee, not the intelligence committee
21 where his Article II powers are clear when it comes to his
22 ability to assign or take away security clearances for
23 different people in those branches.

24 I yield.

25 MR. STEUBE: I yield back to the chair.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

2 Any further request for recognition?

3 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment. The
4 chairman tends to vote no.

5 All those in favor say aye.

6 All those opposed, no.

7 In the opinion of the chair the noes have it.

8 MS. HOULAHAN: Mr. Chair, I request a recorded vote.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: A recorded vote has been requested. That
10 will be rolled to the end of the proceeding.

11 Mr. Gomez.

12 MR. GOMEZ: Mr. Chairman, I have an amendment at the
13 desk.

14 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will designate the amendment.

15 THE CLERK: Amendment number 6, clarification and
16 notifications of certain terminations of employment by
17 director of the Central Intelligence Agency offered by Mr.
18 Gomez.

19 [The amendment of Mr. Gomez can be found in the Appendix
20 on page ?.]

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1 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will distribute the amendment.

2 Mr. Gomez, you are recognized for 5 minutes.

3 MR. GOMEZ: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My amendment would
4 require the director of the CIA to notify this committee
5 whenever the director invokes unilateral statutory authority
6 to determine a CIA officer's employment outside the normal
7 personnel process. Federal law grants the CIA director a
8 unique extraordinary authority. Unlike other agency heads,
9 the director may dismiss an employee at will for any reason
10 if the director determines that it is in the, quote,
11 "interest of the United States."

12 Congress created this authority for a narrow purpose to
13 allow CIA to act swiftly if an officer poses a security risk,
14 without having to wait for administrative procedures to be
15 completed. Unfortunately, this power can be misused.
16 Earlier this year, the current director exercised this
17 authority not to address genuine national security threats,
18 but to remove talented career officers, without even an
19 allegation of wrongdoing, simply because their prior work
20 included work on DEIA programs, explicitly directed and
21 funded by this committee. These officers were given these
22 assignments and they did their duty. These employees should
23 not be pushed out simply because their previous work no
24 longer aligns with the administration's policy or political
25 preferences.

1 My amendment is modest, it does not limit or
2 second-guess the director's termination or authority. It
3 merely ensures that when this extraordinary power to
4 terminate an employee is used outside CIA's standard
5 personnel process, this committee receives a detail
6 notification.

7 I urge my colleagues to support this amendment and I
8 yield back the balance of my time.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: I thank the gentleman.

10 I claim time in opposition. The gentleman's amendment
11 would affect the employment termination policy at the CIA,
12 which has benefited multiple administrations over the past 78
13 years.

14 The gentleman's amendment seems to be a direct response
15 to the administration's personnel decisions earlier this
16 year. These decisions have been challenged through the
17 judicial system and the CIA has provided multiple updates to
18 this committee on those challenges.

19 The CIA through ODNI said it succinctly in their
20 official rebuttal, this amendment. "This termination
21 authority has been unchanged since 1947 when it was
22 universally recognized as an important foundational CIA
23 authority. In fact, the need for which was so self-evident
24 that this authority was provided to the CIA at its stand-up,
25 well in advance of the enactment of the CIA ACT of 1949 which

1 contained CIA's other administrative authorities. Since
2 then, this authority has withstood legal challenges with the
3 breadth of its language upheld twice by the Supreme Court.

4 In addition, this attempt to impose limitations on
5 executive branch action may raise constitutional concerns.
6 This amendment is an attempt to fix a problem that does not
7 exist by restricting an authority not questioned by either
8 party until now. I will vote no on this amendment and I urge
9 all my colleagues to do the same.

10 THE CHAIRMAN: Do any other members seek recognition?

11 Ms. Plaskett.

12 MS. PLASKETT: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman.

13 I do not see how this creates any additional processes
14 for the CIA or for any other agency, particularly at the CIA.
15 We are talking about what happened. Let's not be shy about
16 what occurred. We had very senior officers who volunteered
17 to take on a task that we the Congress gave them to do. And
18 when an administration changed and the administration
19 determined that that task was no longer within the interest
20 of its policy, they didn't reassign them, they terminated
21 them. Officers who had been there for decades, who have
22 experiences and support in defending our country, because
23 policy changed, then the administration's allowed to remove
24 them?

25 That can happen in the next administration, should it be

1 a Democratic administration. Where is a determination made
2 that policies that we exacted on the CIA and told them to
3 execute on that we determined that it is not in our interest
4 anymore, it doesn't meet our political purposes and we
5 terminate these employees? All this amendment is asking is
6 that there must be notification of the congressional
7 intelligence committee of those actions that are being taken.
8 We have not said that we revoke it or we can change it, but
9 there has to be notification. Because as you remember,
10 Mr. Chair and my colleagues, they did not tell us immediately
11 about this, it was only after us inquiring about these
12 firings that they, in fact, gave us a briefing on it. If we
13 had not asked, would they have not said anything?

14 I think we need to put notification in there and make it
15 so that they have to notify us. They are required to notify
16 us about many of the actions that they take. I don't see how
17 this creates an undue burden for an agency to inform us of
18 these actions, particularly when the rationale for doing it
19 is because it is no longer a policy of the incoming
20 administration when the Congress itself had set that policy
21 previously.

22 I yield back.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentlewoman yields.

24 Are there any other members seeking recognition?

25 Mr. Perry.

1 MR. PERRY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2 I don't know how many thousands of employees are at the
3 CIA. I guess we should probably all know that. But, you
4 know, making it somehow an act of Congress to manage the
5 place every time someone is terminated just seems to be
6 grinding the gears down in America, nothing gets -- it just
7 reminds you it took, like, 180 days to build the Empire State
8 Building. I have a bridge in my district that is probably
9 100 feet long, it has taken 180 days to build. This is
10 government.

11 I just remind everybody, CIA employees can sue on the
12 grounds that the termination, if so, was unconstitutional
13 versus in the case Webster v. Doe. So the protection already
14 exists. I am sure no matter what the administration is
15 there, people are going to be let go that some of us here are
16 going to be unhappy about and I am sure we are going to hear
17 about it. You are going to be informed, I guarantee you. So
18 I don't think we need to tell the CIA director that he has
19 got to stop what he is doing and send a memo to us every day
20 about how many employees he hired and how many he fired.

21 With that, I yield the balance.

22 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

23 Is there anybody -- Ms. Houlahan.

24 MS. HOULAHAN: Mr. Chair, I would like to yield my time
25 to Mr. Gomez.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman is recognized.

2 MR. GOMEZ: Thank you so much.

3 First, I just want to be clear, it says outside the CIA
4 standard personnel process. So it's not -- we are not going
5 to get involved in every termination, every firing. It's the
6 ones that are outside CIA's standard personnel process. That
7 is where it is limited to.

8 Additionally, let's kind of -- let's not think about
9 these individuals, because it is about these individuals,
10 let's think about something that we support it now.
11 Individuals that are working on Ukraine, maybe that falls out
12 of political fashion a few years from now because the cost of
13 the conflict gets so bad that, you know, the public turns.
14 Well, what are we going to have the CIA director say, you
15 know what, the President is no longer in favor, the public is
16 no longer in favor of this process, so we are going terminate
17 those individuals because they worked on it? Because they
18 were given that assignment, right? It is not like these
19 folks were -- this is what they specialized in. I have no
20 idea if they went to college for DEI or not. SO that is the
21 point is that these individuals did their duty when it came
22 to these programs. And we shouldn't be firing people because
23 they did a duty that was given to them. And then, it is out
24 of fashion, but when it comes to this administration, because
25 that starts having a chilling effect on the entire agency,

1 all the personnel.

2 Then they will start thinking, you know what, is this a
3 program I really want to work on or am I going out of favor
4 with the public or Democrats or Republicans. We don't want
5 that. We want them to do their jobs. And if the policy
6 changes, then they get reassigned and they implement that
7 whatever policies given before them. So that is what this
8 amendment is about. It is modest, it is not questioning that
9 authority. It is just saying out of the outside CIA standard
10 personnel process, this committee should receive detailed
11 notification.

12 With that, I yield back.

13 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

14 Does any other member seek recognition? Mr. Cohen.

15 MR. COHEN: Mr. Chair, I am new this to committee. Let
16 me ask you a question, do the votes in this committee, are
17 they public?

18 THE CHAIRMAN: They are public. This is an open
19 proceeding. We will go to a closed proceeding. But the end
20 of the proceeding we will do votes on everything that we
21 considered.

22 MR. COHEN: And that is public.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

24 MR. COHEN: And the President would know if people were
25 not supportive of it. Thank you.

1 THE CHAIRMAN: Do any other members seek recognition?

2 Mr. Crenshaw.

3 MR. CRENSHAW: Mr. Chairman, strike the last word. Just
4 one point to make, and we have gone through years with
5 Director Burns in charge. The majority -- the minority --
6 I'm sorry, the majority does not offer these kind of
7 amendments or proposals because we trusted that they were
8 able to fire and hire at will. And I think we are being
9 consistent in our beliefs, whether it is a Democrat or
10 Republican administration on these particular issues. So I
11 definitely have a lot of sympathy for the idea that we should
12 be conducting pretty detailed oversight about personnel
13 issues. In the end, it is an article to power, and I think
14 Ms. Tenney did pretty good arguments on the case law that
15 precedes this, so I yield back.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: The chairman yields.

17 Mr. Castro.

18 MR. CASTRO: I move to strike the last word.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman is recognized.

20 MR. CASTRO: Thank you. We need a policy so that people
21 in these agencies, specifically here in the CIA are not
22 fired, because they took on an assignment over which they had
23 some of them at least no choice and now they are being fired
24 because the director's responding to what the President
25 wants. Some of those folks, putting aside -- if this was not

1 about DEI, if it was about some other assignment, some of
2 these people had no choice over that and then they just get
3 fired so that is incredibly irresponsible. And just for the
4 record, yeah, I think that this attack on DEI is borne of
5 racial animus, it is born of racial animus. And so these
6 people are paying the price because of that agenda.

7 I yield back.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: Is gentleman yields.

9 Any other members seek recognition?

10 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment. The
11 chairman intends to vote no.

12 All those in favor, say aye.

13 All those opposed, no.

14 In the opinion of the chair, the noes have it.

15 MR. GOMEZ: Mr. Chairman, I ask for a recorded vote

16 THE CHAIRMAN: A recorded vote has been requested.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: That will be postponed to the end of the
18 proceeding.

19 Mr. Crow.

20 MR. CROW: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, this amendment is
21 what I believe to be a pretty classic oversight amendment.
22 It zooms out a bit. This is not related to our debate and
23 discussion around whistleblowers or individual leadership or
24 the firing or revocation of security clearances. This is
25 about large muscle movements within the IC. So what this

1 amendment does is it is post action notification, 7 days
2 after the fact. It would inform this committee of large
3 muscle movements within the IC. So any division or element
4 that reduces its force by 50 or more employees or 5 percent
5 of that element's workforce. We, through our budgeting
6 process, regularly look at large muscle movements and changes
7 in the structure and the force of the IC and that is what the
8 spirit of this amendment does.

9 And to be clear, I am not opposed to reform. I believe
10 in government reform. I believe in streamlining. And there
11 are certainly areas in which we can do that. But we need to
12 know about it when we are creating budgets if there are big
13 movements we need to know the impact, we need to know the CI
14 impact, which is one of the things that is called out.
15 Because if there are large reductions in a force of an IC
16 element, that always comes with counterintelligence impacts.
17 We need to know about the cost-benefit analysis and would ask
18 for that as well.

19 And I will point out importantly this actually has
20 nothing to do with who is in the administration. And I know
21 that because this is actually modeled under a similar
22 requirement that we helped pass in the Armed Services
23 Committee in the prior administration, right? So we actually
24 already have this in law, and the Secretary of Defense has to
25 comply with a similar requirement. Again, in the last

1 administration, it has been in law for a while to do that, so
2 that the Armed Services Committee has that information. So I
3 would like our committee to be on par with the Armed Services
4 Committee to have the information to make good legislation,
5 to make good policy, and in our budgeting process, to have
6 the information necessary to do so. And I would ask
7 everyone's support in, again, bringing us up to par on
8 similar requirements that are already in law in other
9 departments.

10 I yield back.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

12 Mr. Steube.

13 MR. STEUBE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I seek time in
14 opposition to this amendment.

15 This amendment levees a cumbersome and extraordinary
16 micromanaging requirement on the executive branch. We should
17 be encouraging efficiency and streamlining of the workforce,
18 not discouraging or penalizing it with burdensome
19 requirements.

20 This amendment diverts valuable resources from
21 protecting our homeland to answering unnecessary reporting
22 requirements. Therefore, I will vote no on this amendment
23 and urge all of my colleagues to do the same.

24 I yield back.

25 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

1 Ms. Plaskett.

2 MS. PLASKETT: First, Mr. Crow, I think by you
3 identifying that Armed Services has it, you may be finding an
4 amendment from our colleagues to try and remove that
5 requirement from them.

6 But I wanted to ask a question as to, I know that this
7 is strictly related to if there is a movement or separation
8 of 50 more employees or 5 percent of employees. In Armed
9 Services or others, I notice that you did not talk about a
10 change in funding. Is that because you believe that funding
11 cannot be moved, or say they were to remove or take away
12 percentage of revenue or budgeted money in a particular
13 program. You didn't address that, was there a reason why you
14 did not?

15 MR. CROW: Yeah, this is not about a funding stream, it
16 is about personnel. That is the focus. We tried to narrowly
17 tailor it, because we don't want this to be cumbersome. We
18 obviously wanted this to be as narrowly tailored as possible
19 but also give this committee information that it needs to
20 conduct policy on again large muscle movements within the IC.

21 MS. PLASKETT: Thank you. And I see I have spent quite
22 a number of years now focused on a particular area and that
23 being in Africa. And I have seen changes in personnel or
24 movements of personnel that have not been recorded to this
25 committee [REDACTED]

8 So, I think that this is informative for us in
9 determining the actions, or inactions, of activity in

13 regular reporting structure of the head of these agencies
14 that this makes sense. And I will be supporting it.

15 I yield back.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentlewoman yields.

17 Do any other members seek recognition?

18 Seeing none, the question is on the amendment. The
19 chairman intends to vote no.

20 All those in favor say aye.

2 MR. HIMES: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, I have an
3 amendment at the desk.

4 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will report the amendment.

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1 THE CHAIRMAN: The clerk will distribute the amendment.
2 Mr. Himes is recognized for 5 minutes to explain his
3 amendment.

4 MR. HIMES: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

5 Colleagues, this amendment would restore the requirement
6 which is stricken in this draft IAA that the DNI submit to
7 the congressional Intelligence Committees the annual report
8 on IC workforce demographics.

9 The IC has been producing this report since 2015,
10 including throughout the entirety of the first Trump
11 administration, without issue or objection.

12 And I want to say, a report on the demographics is not
13 some Trojan horse for wokeness but, rather, simply provides
14 this committee with valuable insight into the composition of
15 the IC workforce.

16 Let me depart from the bullet points here, because I
17 don't want to get back into the conversation of DEI. I
18 promised the chairman, addressing some of his anxieties, that
19 that would not be a major feature of this markup.

20 It is not a mystery to anybody where the administration
21 and where the majority party has gone on DEI. It saddens me,
22 because I know the effect that that has on minority
23 populations in the IC. But I want to make the point that I
24 think, at its best, the majority makes an argument against
25 DEI. Maybe some of it is racial animus. The majority's

1 strongest argument against DEI is in favor of meritocracy,
2 and I have heard this over and over and over again. And I
3 can tell you absolutely that nobody, I think in this room,
4 believes that our CIA, for example, is at its best when it is
5 what it was for two generations, pale, male, Yale, as they
6 used to say.

7 A real meritocracy involves making sure we are reaching
8 out to populations who may never have heard of the CIA. Why?
9 Because the people who are skulking around in alleys in
10 Lusaka probably shouldn't look like me.

11 So I don't want to open the DEI box again, but I do want
12 to say that this elimination of the demographic report -- we
13 are eliminating a report here. And what the minority is
14 proposing is not that we want to mandate racial quotas. We
15 are just saying a meritocracy involves reaching out to
16 underrepresented communities to produce the very best IC.
17 And every Republican in this room knows that you cannot
18 manage what you do not measure.

19 So all I am asking in this amendment is let's do what we
20 did through the first 4 years of the Trump administration and
21 measure something that I think we want to manage.

22 I will yield back.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

24 Any members seek time in opposition?

25 Mr. Kelly.

1 MR. KELLY: Seeking time in opposition, Mr. Chairman.

2 The report that the minority wants to preserve requires
3 the DNI on an annual basis to submit a report on the
4 employment of racial and ethnic minorities, women and
5 individuals with disabilities in the IC.

6 As this committee well knows, President Trump signed an
7 executive order to terminate all DEI programs, mandates,
8 policies, preferences and activities in the Federal
9 Government. Therefore, this committee is taking action where
10 it can codify this EO in statute, and that includes repealing
11 reports like this. An executive order can easily be
12 rescinded in the future. By repealing DEI activities and
13 reports in law, we are proofing for the future administra- --
14 for future administrations being able to easily stand these
15 functions back up.

16 It is also worth noting that the ODNI component tasked
17 with compiling this report, the IC Human Capital Office, no
18 longer exists. Furthermore, I don't believe taxpayer dollars
19 should be spent on annual DEI reports. The American people
20 spoke clearly in the last election that they want to move
21 forward from the destructive hyperfocus on identity politics.
22 The right people with the right skill should be hired
23 regardless of their race, color, gender or any other class of
24 identity.

25 I will vote no on this amendment, and I urge all my

1 colleagues to do the same.

2 With that, Mr. Chairman, I yield back.

3 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

4 Mr. Quigley.

5 MR. QUIGLEY: Look, I have said this before. [REDACTED]

22 Because as the ranking member said, if you look like us,
23 you are not going to do really well in most countries of the
24 world. You have to reflect what the world looks like, and it
25 is not just language skills, as I have heard before.

1 So if we could please assess this as a moment of
2 meritocracy as well, but abilities, the ability to talk about
3 these things, because it makes us more effective. So for
4 that reason alone, you should support this amendment.

5 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

6 Any other members seek recognition?

7 Mr. Perry.

8 MR. PERRY: I just remind everybody in the room that the
9 DNI -- the current serving DNI served in this body as a
10 Democrat.

11 That having been said, I just got to say this. I think
12 as American citizens, as Democrats, as Republicans, we all
13 have entrusted that the people in charge of the intelligence
14 agencies and operations of this country, we grant them the
15 benefit of the doubt that they are working on the best
16 interests of the United States regardless of their party.

17 And, unfortunately, at least from my perspective, that
18 deference has been abused over the course of time with these
19 DEI policies, because we shouldn't be choosing people based
20 only and solely on their immutable characteristics. As a
21 matter of fact, we started a country so that we wouldn't do
22 that. And the people, at least that I want to associate
23 myself with, find it immoral, unethical and, indeed, unlawful
24 to do such things. But that is exactly what has happened.

25 And so we are saying, you know, let's get back to what

1 this country was founded on and let's get people that want to
2 do the job, that can do the job, based on what they can
3 offer, what they can provide, what their success rate is, as
4 opposed to this quota system that has been put in place to
5 the peril -- look, the mission of these organizations is to
6 keep America safe and keep our enemies at bay in the
7 clandestine services, not to have drag queen parties, you
8 know, in the hallways of the intelligence agencies. That
9 doesn't support the mission. I don't care who you are. And
10 we all know it. Like, we all know it.

11 That all having been said, I don't know why anybody
12 needs this data if it is not for unconstitutional
13 discrimination, which is -- let's face it, that is what has
14 occurred. And all of the antidiscrimination laws have an
15 exception for bona fide job requirements.

16 Look, I agree with the ranking member that you can't
17 have certain people that look like me in certain places of
18 the world operating in a clandestine fashion because you are
19 going to be obvious and you are not going to do a good job.

20 I, as a matter of fact, when I was a young man, I
21 thought I might join the clandestine service. But when I was
22 a young man, we had a thing called the phone book. And you
23 know what wasn't in the phone book? The Central Intelligence
24 Agency. There was no internet. You couldn't, like -- you
25 know, unless you were going to drive to Langley, I guess --

1 to this day I don't even know how I would have tried to join.
2 I guess I could have contacted my Member of Congress, but
3 that is not something everyday people did. I mean, we had
4 party lines when I was growing up. You picked up the phone
5 and somebody else, your neighbor was on it.

6 You know, so, look, I know that a lot of people want to
7 serve, and we want everybody to be able to serve that is
8 going to best serve this Nation based on their capabilities
9 and the needs -- let's remember this -- and the needs of the
10 service, the needs of the service.

11 It is not necessarily about, you know, what -- people
12 say, well, I want to be tested, I want to serve, I want to do
13 whatever I want to do. It isn't about you. It is about the
14 needs of this country and the requirements that come with
15 that.

16 And when that lines up with what you want, that is
17 great; but when it doesn't, like, I am sorry, your services
18 aren't needed. That is just how -- not all of us are capable
19 of all things. We are all a little different. We all bring
20 different assets and properties to the equation. And
21 sometimes what you bring just isn't what we need right now,
22 and we shouldn't be forced to hire you just because you want
23 to be hired.

24 And that is what -- you have abused -- your party has
25 abused the good graces and the deference that this party has

1 given you over time, knowing and thinking and believing and
2 wanting to trust that you had the best interests of
3 preserving the security of this Nation in mind, and when in
4 many cases, unfortunately, something else was a priority for
5 you instead of that. And that cannot be. That cannot be.

6 I urge a no vote on this amendment, and I yield the
7 balance.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

9 Mr. Gomez.

10 MR. GOMEZ: Mr. Chairman, I just want to kind of point
11 out some of the contradictions that the majority is making
12 over there. On this amendment, you are opposed because, you
13 know what, we are trying to determine what kind of
14 individuals are selected, that we should do it based on
15 skills and talents and abilities and what they bring to the
16 table. I agree with you.

17 But then you are opposed to my amendment because we are
18 questioning -- we want a report on the individuals that are
19 fired for doing their duty because they worked on something
20 they didn't want to. You don't care about do they have the
21 skills.

22 What skills did they have in these positions from prior
23 assignments? You know, did they have certain language
24 skills? Did they have certain technical skills? Did they
25 have certain expertise?

1 So that is why I find it kind of interesting that, you
2 know what, we care about the merits. Do they have the skills
3 or not? But then at the same time, you know what, they were
4 working on a DEI assignment and it became out of fashion so
5 we fired them, and we don't care if they had other skills
6 that we needed.

7 Like, that is where I see as contradictory. That is
8 where, like, you care about merit and skill set, but it is --
9 but unless, exactly. So that is what I kind of find, I don't
10 know, ironic. I don't know what I would say.

11 But here is the thing. We all want the whole -- we want
12 the best and most talented individuals, period. That is a
13 given. And maybe if the last gentleman who spoke, you know,
14 you couldn't find the agency, that is the job of the agency
15 is to go out there in the public to figure out what -- first,
16 what do we need and then go and find those skill sets and
17 those individuals that are best suited for those assignments.

18 So, with that, I am supporting this amendment, but I
19 guess the contradictions and the mental gymnastics that the
20 majority has to make in order to justify no votes on both
21 amendments is I think striking.

22 With that, I yield back.

23 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

24 Mr. Crenshaw.

25 MR. CRENSHAW: I move to strike the last word.

1 I want to take down the temperature a bit. I want to
2 address some of the operational concerns about diversity and
3 some of the things said and also justify our opposition to
4 this.

5 Of course, it seems like a harmless report that has been
6 going on for a long time, but I think there is a valid
7 feeling that that report is then used to encourage some kind
8 of quota system that does have some kind of relationship with
9 what we view as DEI. I don't think that is out of the realm
10 of crazy.

11 As far as diversity goes within the IC, I fully agree
12 that there is -- inherently because of the job there has to
13 be an element of diversity. I also think that our leaders in
14 the IC absolutely understand that.

15 I have been to a lot of stations, a lot, and a couple
16 observations: One, they are extremely diverse every single
17 time. The second -- yes, they are. I think I -- I have been
18 to a lot. I have been to a lot in my prior life and in this
19 job, okay?

20 And here's the other thing. You know, if you go to a
21 place like, let's say, India, you are not going to find all
22 Indian Americans working there, nor should you. And if you
23 actually look at the tactical reasoning behind that, it is
24 not obvious that a White guy like me should not be running
25 around in a country where no one looks like me. That is

1 actually not obviously true.

8 look like people from Mexico. You are in less danger if you

19 is a requirement, and I also disagree with the idea that they
20 are not already doing it. This is a very, very diverse
21 community. I have seen it over and over again.

22 And so I do feel like, you know, again, given our
23 concerns about the potential for using this data as a quota
24 system, and the fact that I think we are getting the
25 operational necessities just slightly off and that there is a

1 lot more nuance there that people understand, I think we have
2 good reason to oppose this amendment.

3 And I yield back.

4 THE CHAIRMAN: The gentleman yields.

5 Do any other members seek time?

6 The question then is on the amendment. The chairman
7 does not support, intend to vote no.

4 both sides for all their hard work. If every year we were
5 just voting on people's hard work, it would be excellent
6 every year. But substantively there are things that give me
7 grave concern and I wanted to voice that. So I would be
8 against it.

9 THE CHAIRMAN: I thank the gentlemen.

10 There being no further discussion, I move for adoption
11 of H.R. 5167, as amended, the Intelligence Authorization Act
12 for Fiscal Year 2026.

13 Question is on the adoption of H.R. 5167, as amended,
14 which includes the unclassified legislative text as well as
15 the Classified Annex and schedule of authorizations.

23 favorably to the House the bill H.R. 5167, as amended,
24 including by reference the classified schedule of
25 authorizations.

2 gentlemen from Connecticut, Mr. Himes.

5 In the opinion of the chair, with a quorum being
6 present, the ayes have it. The motion is agreed to.

9 We must authorize Members of the House of
10 Representatives an opportunity to review the classified
11 schedule of the authorizations, as well as the Classified
12 Annex with any and all necessary measures to protect our most
13 sensitive sources and methods. Therefore, the chair moves
14 that the committee authorize Members to review the classified
15 schedule authorizations and annex for a period of up to 3
16 days in advance of floor consideration in the House of H.R.
17 5167, as amended, the Intelligence Authorization Act for
18 Fiscal Year 2026.

19 The chair further moves that should the chair determine
20 the floor consideration in the House of H.R. 5167 is
21 unlikely, the committee authorizes Members to reclassify the
22 scheduled authorizations in annex for a period of up to 3
23 days jointly determine by the chair and ranking member.

24 Without objection, the previous question is ordered, and
25 the clerk will call the roll.

1 We don't need to call the roll on that. We don't need
2 to call the roll on that.

3 I would ask unanimous consent the committee staff be
4 authorized to make necessary conforming, technical, clerical
5 changes to the annex as well the bill adopted by the
6 committee to include the classified schedule of
7 authorizations which the bill incorporates by reference and
8 to remove from the bill, as amended, provisions that would
9 cause the bill to refer to the other committees and result in
10 additional direct spending.

11 Without objection, so ordered.

12 I ask unanimous consent that the committee's security
13 director be authorized to review the transcript of today's
14 open business meeting to make any redactions necessary to
15 protect classified or other protected information.

16 Without objection, so ordered.

17 I ask unanimous consent that, consistent with House
18 rules, Members be given 2 additional calendar days to file
19 supplemental minority reviews to committee report House on
20 H.R. 5167 pursuant to clause 2(1) of House rule XI.

21 Without objection, so ordered.

22 There being no further legislative business before the
23 committee, this meeting is adjourned.

24 By the way, for the record, let me add this. This staff
25 on both sides did fantastic work, so a big round of applause

1 for them. I think all of you all did so much.

2 I also want to welcome a new staffer, Nico. And he,
3 unlike most of our members, he managed to stay awake through
4 this entire proceed.
