## AN ACT

Making the first day of January, the twenty-fifth day of December, the fourth day of July, and Thanksgiving day, holidays, within the District of Columbia.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

- 3 That the following days to wit: The first day of January,
- 4 commonly called New Year's Day, the fourth day of July,
  5 the twenty-fifth day of December commonly called Cl. :
- 5 the twenty-fifth day of December, commonly called Christ-6 mas Day, and any day appointed or recommended by the
- 7 President of the United States as a day of public fast or
- 8 thanksgiving shall be holidays within the District of Colum-
- 9 bia, and shall for all purposes of presenting for payment or
- 10 acceptance for the maturity and protest, and giving notice of
- the dishonor of bills of exchange, bank checks, and promisory
  notes or other negotiable or commencial and the checks.
