

# H. R. 1654.

IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

MAY 1, 1872.

Referred to the Committee on Appropriations and ordered to be printed.

## AN ACT

Making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of the Government for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and for former years, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*  
3 That the following sums, or so much thereof as may be neces-  
4 sary, be, and the same are hereby, appropriated for the  
5 service of the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred  
6 and seventy-two, or for the period and purposes hereinafter  
7 expressed, namely :

8 HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

9 For cartage for the House of Representatives, three  
10 thousand dollars; and constructive cartage shall not (1) [here-  
11 after] be paid for, but all articles delivered on the trip shall  
12 be paid for as one load.

13 To pay the official reporters of the Globe in each  
 14 House the amount which the Comptroller of the Treasury  
 15 may find severally due them for services during the sessions  
 16 of the Forty-second Congress, under the eighteenth section  
 17 of the act entitled "An act making appropriations for sundry  
 18 civil expenses of the Government for the year ending June  
 19 thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, and for other  
 20 purposes," approved July twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred  
 21 and sixty-six.

22 That the Speaker is hereby authorized to employ a (2) [pri-  
 23 vate] clerk, at a salary of eighteen hundred dollars per annum,  
 24 and no appointment on the doorkeeper's rolls shall be made to  
 25 take the place of the person hitherto detailed as clerk to the  
 26 Speaker, and from March first to the close of this fiscal year,  
 27 six hundred dollars is hereby appropriated for his salary.

28 (3) *SENATE.*

29 *To pay the mileage of Senators for attendance at the*  
 30 *session of the Senate convened on the tenth day of May,*  
 31 *eighteen hundred and seventy-one, by proclamation of the*  
 32 *President, twenty-nine thousand nine hundred dollars.*

33 *For miscellaneous items, fifteen thousand dollars.*

34 *For labor, seven thousand five hundred dollars.*

35 *For furniture, three thousand six hundred dollars.*

36 *For expenses of heating and ventilating apparatus for*

37 *fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and*  
 38 *seventy-one, four hundred dollars.*

39 *For compensation of John C. Knowlton, for service as*  
 40 *messenger in the Senate during the month of April, eighteen*  
 41 *hundred and sixty-nine, one hundred and twenty dollars.*

42 *To pay Rives and Bailey for complete sets of the Con-*  
 43 *gressional Globe and appendix, furnished to Senators who*  
 44 *had not previously received them, under the act of July*  
 45 *fourth, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, three thousand and*  
 46 *five dollars.*

47 *For clerks to committees, pages, horses, and carryalls,*  
 48 *ten thousand dollars.*

49 **CAPITOL POLICE.**

50 *For captain of the police, two hundred and eighty-eight*  
 51 *dollars; for two lieutenants, at three hundred dollars each;*  
 52 *and twenty-eight privates, at three hundred and eighty-four*  
 53 *dollars each; in all, eleven thousand six hundred and forty*  
 54 *dollars.*

55 **LIBRARY OF CONGRESS.**

56 *For contingent expenses of the Library of Congress,*  
 57 *rendered necessary by the copyright business of said library,*  
 58 *five hundred dollars. (4) To enable the disbursing agent of*  
 59 *the Joint Committee on the Library to balance sundry frac-*  
 60 *tional overdrafts in the following funds: For the fiscal years of*  
 61 *eighteen hundred and seventy-one and eighteen hundred and*

62 *seventy-two, two hundred and fifty-seven dollars and eight*  
 63 *cents, the same to be placed to the credit of the funds named*  
 64 *in the amount specified to each. Fund for purchase of books,*  
 65 *twelve dollars and ninety-eight cents; fund for purchase*  
 66 *of law-books, twenty-five dollars and seventy-nine cents; fund*  
 67 *for purchase of periodicals, two dollars and sixty-five cents;*  
 68 *fund for exchange of public documents, six dollars and sev-*  
 69 *enty cents; fund for repairs, and so forth, of buildings in*  
 70 *Botanic Garden, seventy-five dollars and seventeen cents;*  
 71 *fund for improving Botanic Garden, one hundred and twenty-*  
 72 *five dollars; fund for contingent expenses of the Library,*  
 73 *eight dollars and seventy-nine cents.*

74       To pay Rives and Bailey for the reporting and publica-  
 75 tion of the debates and proceedings of the Forty-first Con-  
 76 gress, under the joint resolution approved March third,  
 77 eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and contract of April four-  
 78 teenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, so far as may have  
 79 been provided for by law, two thousand seven hundred and  
 80 seventy-six dollars and ninety-eight cents, or so much thereof  
 81 as may be necessary.

## 82                   DEPARTMENT OF STATE.

83       For extra clerk-hire necessitated by unusual labor in pre-  
 84 paring for the session of the tribunal of arbitration at Geneva,  
 85 five thousand dollars.

86       For publishing the laws of the third session of the Forty-

87 first Congress and of the first session of the Forty-second  
88 Congress in pamphlet form, five thousand dollars.

89 For publishing the laws of the first session of the Forty-  
90 first Congress in newspapers, two thousand one hundred dol-  
91 lars.

92 For publishing the laws of the second session of the  
93 Forty-first Congress in newspapers, six thousand one hundred  
94 and twelve dollars.

95 FOREIGN INTERCOURSE.—For salaries of envoys extraor-  
96 dinary, and ministers plenipotentiary, and ministers resident,  
97 for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and  
98 seventy-one, forty-two thousand dollars; and for the fiscal  
99 year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-  
100 two, fifty thousand dollars; (5) *and in settling the accounts of*  
101 *John P. Hale, late minister to Spain, the accounting officers*  
102 *of the Treasury shall allow him salary to the first of January,*  
103 *eighteen hundred and seventy, at which time his health was so far*  
104 *restored as to be able to travel, and the sum necessary to pay*  
105 *the same is hereby appropriated. And the Secretary of*  
106 *State is hereby authorized to allow the payment of such sums*  
107 *as the President shall approve to the consuls of the United*  
108 *States at Algiers, Boulogne, Lyons, Marseilles, Nantes,*  
109 *Nice, and Rheims, as compensation for extraordinary*  
110 *services during the late war in Europe: Provided, That*  
111 *the total sum so expended shall not exceed the unexpended*

112 *balance of the amount appropriated by the fourth and fifth*  
 113 *paragraphs of the act entitled "An act making appropria-*  
 114 *tions for sundry civil expenses of the Government for the*  
 115 *fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and*  
 116 *seventy-two, and for other purposes," approved March third,*  
 117 *eighteen hundred and seventy-one.*

118       For contingent expenses of the United States consulates  
 119 for blank-books and stationery, for the fiscal year ending  
 120 June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, fifteen  
 121 thousand dollars; and for the fiscal year ending June thir-  
 122 tieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, fifteen thousand  
 123 dollars.

124       For pay of dragoman at the consulate at Constanti-  
 125 nople from April first, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, to  
 126 March thirty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, four  
 127 hundred dollars.

128       For improvements and alteration of the Protestant cem-  
 129 etery in Malaga, Spain, five hundred dollars.

130       To reimburse the consul of the United States in the city  
 131 of Mexico for the care of the Protestant American ceme-  
 132 tery during the past year, for the current fiscal year, and to  
 133 pay salary of keeper, five hundred dollars, one thousand one  
 134 hundred and five dollars.

135       For the annual proportion of the United States of the

136 expenses of Cape Spartel light, on the coast of Morocco,  
137 two hundred and eighty-five dollars.

138 For additional expenses of the United States legation  
139 in France, consequent upon the removal of the seat of gov-  
140 ernment from Paris to Versailles, eight hundred dollars.

141 (6) *To defray the extraordinary expenses of the Ameri-*  
142 *can minister to the kingdom of Italy occasioned by the*  
143 *removal of its capital from Turin to Florence and from*  
144 *Florence to Rome, six thousand dollars.*

145 *To enable Robert C. Schenck, minister to Great Britain,*  
146 *to pay his private amanuensis, as provided by joint resolu-*  
147 *tion approved January eleventh, eighteen hundred and sev-*  
148 *enty-one, from the date of the approval of said joint resolu-*  
149 *tion to July first, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, one*  
150 *thousand one hundred and eighty dollars.*

151 For the relief and protection of American seamen in  
152 foreign countries, one hundred thousand dollars.

### 153 INQUIRY RESPECTING FOOD-FISHES.

154 For continuing the inquiry into the cause of the de-  
155 crease of the food-fishes of the coast and of the lakes, three  
156 thousand five hundred dollars.

157 For preparation of the illustrations, tables, and so forth,  
158 of the report of the United States Commissioner of Fish  
159 and Fisheries, five hundred dollars.

160 (7) [TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

161 OFFICE OF COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS.—For one clerk  
162 of class two, seven hundred dollars.

163 For two clerks of class one, one thousand two hundred  
164 dollars.]

165 UNITED STATES MINTS AND BRANCHES.

166 BRANCH MINT, SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA.—For  
167 wages of workmen and adjusters, twenty-one thousand five  
168 hundred dollars.

169 BRANCH MINT, CARSON CITY, NEVADA.—For salaries  
170 and expenses, (deficiency during fiscal year ending June  
171 thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy,) three thousand  
172 dollars.

173 For wages of workmen and adjusters, for fiscal year  
174 ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two,  
175 six thousand dollars.

176 For contingent expenses, to wit, for sundry miscellane-  
177 ous items, including wood, charcoal, and freight, for the  
178 fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and  
179 seventy-two, twelve thousand four hundred dollars.

180 For contingent expenses of the same character, for the  
181 fiscal years ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and  
182 seventy, and June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy  
183 one, three thousand dollars. (8) *For this amount deficiency*



184 *in the construction of the assay-office, Boise City, Idaho Ter-*  
 185 *ritory, two thousand ninety-two dollars and five cents.*

186 INDEPENDENT TREASURY.

187 Contingent expenses under the act of August sixth,  
 188 eighteen hundred and forty-six: For the collection, safe-  
 189 keeping, transferring, and disbursement of the public mon-  
 190 eys, one hundred thousand dollars.

191 To pay deficiencies in the salaries of officers, clerks,  
 192 and others in the office of the assistant treasurer in New  
 193 York City for the present fiscal year, nine thousand three  
 194 hundred and four dollars.

195 (9) [For deficiency in the salary of deputy treasurer, assay-  
 196 office, New York, for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth,  
 197 eighteen hundred and seventy-two, fifteen hundred dollars.]

198 TERRITORIAL GOVERNMENTS.

199 DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.—To pay the governor, secre-  
 200 tary, and three members of the board of public works of  
 201 the District of Columbia such sums as may be due them  
 202 for salaries from the date of their commissions to the first of  
 203 July, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, three thousand  
 204 eight hundred and fifty-one dollars and fourteen cents, or so  
 205 much thereof as may be necessary.

206 To pay the members of the board of health from the  
 207 date of their appointment to the first of July, eighteen hun-  
 208 dred and seventy-two, at two thousand dollars each per an-  
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209 num, twelve thousand one hundred and ninety-two dollars  
 210 and fifty-six cents, or so much thereof as may be necessary.

211 (10) *For compensation to the president and members of*  
 212 *the council of the District of Columbia, for the session com-*  
 213 *mencing on the eighth of November, eighteen hundred and*  
 214 *seventy-one, two thousand eight hundred and eighty dollars.*

215 For deficiency in appropriation for legislative ex-  
 216 penses of Montana Territory, for the fiscal year ending June  
 217 thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, the same to be  
 218 expended in publishing the laws and journals of the last  
 219 session of the legislature of said Territory, the sum of five  
 220 thousand dollars.

221 (11) *For printing and binding house and council jour-*  
 222 *nals of the fifth session of the legislative assembly of Montana*  
 223 *Territory, two thousand four hundred dollars.*

224 *For compensation of members of the fifth legislature of*  
 225 *Montana Territory, eight hundred and forty-seven dollars.*

226 (12) *For rent of office, salary of messenger, furniture,*  
 227 *carpet, postage, and other incidental expenses of the secre-*  
 228 *tary of the Territory of New Mexico, for the fiscal year ending*  
 229 *June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, one thou-*  
 230 *sand three hundred and fifty dollars and eighty-two cents.*

231 (13) *For expenses of the secretary's office of the Territory*  
 232 *of Arizona, rent of office, fuel, lights, printing, postage,*  
 233 *storage of furniture, and so forth, three thousand dollars.*

234 (14) *For expenses of the secretary's office of the Territory*  
 235 *of Wyoming, fuel, lights, stationery, postage, and so forth,*  
 236 *one thousand two hundred dollars.*

237 (15) *For miscellaneous printing, and printing journals*  
 238 *of council and house of the nineteenth annual session of the*  
 239 *legislative assembly of the Territory of Utah, one thousand*  
 240 *seven hundred and fifty dollars and forty cents.*

241 (16) *For deficiency of appropriation for legislative ex-*  
 242 *penses of the Territory of Dakota, for the fiscal years ending*  
 243 *June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and June*  
 244 *thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, viz: For print-*  
 245 *ing and binding, four*                      *three hundred and seventy-five*  
 246 *dollars; for office rent, four hundred and twenty-five dollars;*  
 247 *for incidental expenses, one thousand two hundred dollars;*  
 248 *in all, six thousand dollars.*

## 249 INTERNAL REVENUE.

250 *For stamps, paper, and dies for the use of the office of*  
 251 *Internal Revenue, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars.*

## 252 CAPTURED AND ABANDONED PROPERTY.

253 *For payment of necessary expenses incurred in defending*  
 254 *suits against the Secretary of the Treasury, or his agents, and*  
 255 *for defense of the United States in respect to such property,*  
 256 (17) *and in the recovery of property claimed to have accrued or*  
 257 *belonged to the United States through the suppression of the*  
 258 *rebellion, and for settling the accounts of agents employed*

259 *in recovering such property*, to be expended under the  
 260 direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, (18) [fifteen] *thirty*  
 261 thousand dollars.

262 UNITED STATES COAST SURVEY.

263 For repairs and maintenance of the complement of  
 264 vessels used in the Coast Survey, per act of March second,  
 265 eighteen hundred and fifty-three, thirty thousand dollars.

266 For pay and rations of the engineers for the steamers  
 267 used in the Coast Survey, no longer supplied by the Navy  
 268 Department, ten thousand dollars.

269 PUBLIC BUILDINGS THROUGHOUT THE UNITED  
 270 STATES.

271 For the completion of the building for custom-house at  
 272 Astoria, Oregon, twenty thousand four hundred and forty-two  
 273 dollars and fifty cents, and for fencing, grading, sidewalks,  
 274 sewerage, and other matters indispensable to its completion,  
 275 five thousand six hundred and eight-six dollars and forty  
 276 cents; in all, twenty-six thousand one hundred and twenty-  
 277 eight dollars and ninety cents.

278 (19) *For continuing the work on the new State De-*  
 279 *partment building during the balance of the present fiscal*  
 280 *year, two hundred thousand dollars.*

281 For extension and repair of the building for custom-  
 282 house and post-office at Baltimore, Maryland, (20) [fifty]  
 283 *twenty-five* thousand dollars.

284       For completion of the building for marine hospital at  
285 Chicago, Illinois, seventy-seven thousand three hundred and  
286 eighty-three dollars and eighty-nine cents; and for grading  
287 and fencing, thirteen thousand nine hundred and eighty-seven  
288 dollars and five cents; and to make good the damage done to  
289 the building and loss by fire, fourteen thousand and sixty dol-  
290 lars and fifty cents; in all, one hundred and five thousand four  
291 hundred and thirty-one dollars and forty-four cents.

292       For continuation of the construction of the building for  
293 custom-house at Knoxville, Tennessee, one hundred thousand  
294 dollars.

295       For completing the building for custom-house at Port-  
296 land, Maine, ten thousand eight hundred and fifty-one dollars.

297       For completing the building for post-office and court-  
298 house at Portland, Maine, fifteen thousand three hundred  
299 and ninety-eight dollars.

300       For putting a new roof on the custom and post-office  
301 building at Newport, in the State of Rhode Island, to be so  
302 arranged as to afford an additional story, and for remod-  
303 eling the interior of said building, and such other repairs as  
304 may be necessary, the sum of eleven thousand two hundred  
305 and forty-one dollars and seventy-five cents.

306       For additional machinery for the appraisers' stores in  
307 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, five thousand five hundred and  
308 fifty-nine dollars and fifty-five cents.

309 For grading, paving, sidewalks, and fences of the ap-  
 310 proaches to the building for custom-house at Saint Paul,  
 311 Minnesota, fifteen thousand nine hundred and eleven dollars  
 312 and fifty cents.

313 (21) *For rent of the office of the assistant treasurer of*  
 314 *the United States at Saint Louis, Missouri, one thousand*  
 315 *five hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary*  
 316 *for the remainder of the present fiscal year, and for fitting*  
 317 *up the office, one thousand dollars.*

318 (22) *To reimburse the city of Detroit, Michigan, the amount*  
 319 *expended in laying a wood pavement in front of the marine hos-*  
 320 *pital property in said city, one thousand eight hundred dollars.*

321 (23) *To supply furniture for the new custom-house at*  
 322 *Machias, Maine, three thousand seven hundred and sixty-six*  
 323 *dollars.*

#### 324 TREASURY, MISCELLANEOUS.

325 For rebuilding the light-station at Manistee, Michigan,  
 326 which was destroyed by fire on the eighth of October,  
 327 eighteen hundred and seventy-one, ten thousand dollars.

328 For repairs and preservation of public buildings under  
 329 the control of the Treasury Department, fifty thousand  
 330 dollars.

331 (24) *For re-arranging the heating apparatus of the*  
 332 *Treasury building, according to plans to be approved by the*

333 *Secretary of the Treasury, nineteen thousand eight hundred*  
 334 *and forty dollars.*

335       For furniture and repairs of furniture for public build-  
 336 ings under the control of the Treasury Department for the  
 337 fiscal years prior to the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen  
 338 hundred and seventy, three thousand two hundred and fifty-  
 339 three dollars and eighty-five cents.

340       For repairs and preservation of public buildings under  
 341 the control of the Treasury Department for fiscal years prior  
 342 to the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and sev-  
 343 enty, seven thousand six hundred and fifty dollars and  
 344 ninety-two cents.

345       For re-establishing lights and other aids to navigation on  
 346 the southern coast for the fiscal years prior to the year end-  
 347 ing June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy, one thou-  
 348 sand eight hundred and fifty-eight dollars and ninety cents:  
 349 *Provided*, That this and the two immediately preceding  
 350 paragraphs do not involve any appropriation from the Treas-  
 351 ury, but are merely an authorization to the proper officers to  
 352 make upon the books of the Treasury transfer entries to  
 353 settle certain accounts.

354       (25) [To pay the commissions allowed by the act of  
 355 March third, eighteen hundred and fifty-one, to collectors of  
 356 customs acting as superintendents of lights, forty-eight thou-  
 357 sand dollars.]

358        *For deficiency in the salary of the deputy treasurer of*  
 359   *the assay-office in New York for the current year, one thou-*  
 360   *sand five hundred dollars.*

361        To enable the Secretary of the Treasury to settle the  
 362   accounts of collectors of customs acting as superintendents  
 363   of lights, outside the districts for which they were appointed,  
 364   for expenditures already made in pursuance of law, and  
 365   which will not involve any actual expenditure, a transfer on  
 366   the books of the Treasury of such sums as may be necessary  
 367   is hereby authorized.

368        For vaults, safes, and locks for public buildings under  
 369   the control of the Treasury Department for fiscal year ending  
 370   June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, fifty  
 371   thousand dollars.

372        (26) [That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he  
 373   hereby is, authorized to pay to the Second Comptroller  
 374   additional compensation to equalize his salary with that of  
 375   the First Comptroller : *Provided*, That with such additional  
 376   compensation the appropriation for the Second Comptroller's  
 377   Office for the present fiscal year shall not be exceeded.]  
 378   *That the salary of the Second Comptroller of the Treasury*  
 379   *shall, after the thirtieth day of June, eighteen hundred and*  
 380   *seventy-one, be five thousand dollars.*

381        To pay John P. Bruce the amount appropriated to be  
 382   paid him by the act of July fifteenth, eighteen hundred and



383 seventy, for printing for the third session of the legislature  
 384 of the Territory of Montana, but which has not been paid  
 385 but is now directed to be paid to him, and his receipt shall  
 386 be deemed a sufficient voucher for payment of the same by  
 387 the accounting officers of the Treasury, seven hundred and  
 388 ninety-six dollars and ninety cents.

389       (27) To pay John Gordon, messenger in the Post-Office  
 390 Department, for extra service from March fourth, eighteen  
 391 hundred and fifty-three, to March third, eighteen hundred  
 392 and fifty-seven, five hundred dollars.

393       To enable the Secretary of the Treasury to pay certain  
 394 gaugers employed in the thirty-second district of the State  
 395 of New York, under the late collector of internal revenue,  
 396 J. F. Bailey, fees earned by them during part of the month  
 397 of March, eighteen hundred and seventy, seven hundred and  
 398 four dollars and twenty cents.

399       For the payment of the salary of the secretary of the  
 400 Territory of New Mexico, as superintendent of public  
 401 buildings and grounds for the years ending June thirty,  
 402 eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and June thirtieth,  
 403 eighteen hundred and seventy-two, two thousand dollars;  
 404 and so much of the second section of the act of July  
 405 twenty-seven, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, (Statutes  
 406 at Large, Chapter CCLXXII,) as grants a salary to the  
 407 secretary of said Territory as superintendent of public  
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buildings and grounds, is hereby repealed, the repeal to take effect at the end of the current fiscal year.

(28) *To enable the Secretary of the Treasury to pay the annual salary of the United States marshal of Nebraska from the date of the admission of the State, at the rate of four hundred dollars per annum, one thousand one hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary.*

To pay O. P. Rockwell, late mail-contractor in Utah Territory, balance due him, one thousand three hundred and ten dollars and sixty-three cents.

(29) [For expenses of the secretary's office of the Territory of Arizona, rent of office, fuel, lights, printing, postage, storage of furniture, and so forth, three thousand dollars.

For expenses of the secretary's office of the Territory of Wyoming, fuel, lights, stationery, postage, &c., twelve hundred dollars.]

#### WAR DEPARTMENT.

(30) [CIVIL ESTABLISHMENT.—For the office of the Quartermaster General, for stationery, office furniture, repairs, and for indispensable miscellaneous items, two thousand five hundred dollars.]

MILITARY ESTABLISHMENT.—For the Pay Department, for the allowance to the officers of the Army for transportation of themselves and their baggage, when trav-

432 eling on duty, without troops, escort, or supplies, ninety  
433 thousand dollars.

434       QUARTERMASTER'S DEPARTMENT.—For regular sup-  
435 plies, consisting of fuel for officers, enlisted men, guards,  
436 hospitals, store-houses and offices, and for forage in kind for  
437 the horses, mules, and oxen of the Quartermaster's Depart-  
438 ment at the several posts and stations, and with the armies  
439 in in the field; for the horses of the several regiments of cav-  
440 alry, the batteries of artillery, and such companies of infan-  
441 try as may be mounted, and for the authorized number of  
442 officers' horses when serving in the field and at the outposts,  
443 including bedding for the animals; of straw for soldiers'  
444 bedding; and of stationery, including blank books for the  
445 Quartermaster's Department, certificates for discharged sol-  
446 diers, blank forms for the Pay and Quartermaster's Depart-  
447 ments, and for printing of division and department orders  
448 and reports, (31) [three] *two* hundred and fifty thousand  
449 dollars.

450       For the general and incidental expenses of the Quar-  
451 termaster's Department, consisting of postage on letters,  
452 and telegrams or dispatches, received and sent on public serv-  
453 ice; extra pay to soldiers employed under the direction of  
454 the Quartermaster's Department, in the erection of barracks,  
455 quarters, store-houses, and hospitals, in the construction of  
456 roads, and other constant labor, for periods of not less than

457 ten days, under the acts of March second, eighteen hundred  
458 and nineteen, and August fourth, eighteen hundred and fifty-  
459 four, including those employed as clerks at division and  
460 department headquarters and hospital stewards on clerical  
461 duty; expenses of expresses to and from the frontier posts  
462 and armies in the field; of escorts to paymasters and other  
463 disbursing officers, and to trains where military escorts can-  
464 not be furnished; expenses of the interment of officers killed  
465 in action, or who die when on duty in the field, or at posts  
466 on the frontiers and other places, when ordered by the Sec-  
467 retary of War, and of non-commissioned officers and sol-  
468 diers; authorized office furniture; hire of laborers in the  
469 Quartermaster's Department, including the hire of interpre-  
470 ters, spies, and guides for the Army; compensation of clerks  
471 to officers of the Quartermaster's Department; compensa-  
472 tion of forage and wagon masters, authorized by the act of  
473 July fifth, eighteen hundred and thirty-eight; for the appre-  
474 hension, securing, and delivering of deserters, and the ex-  
475 penses incident to their pursuit; and for the following  
476 expenditures required for the several regiments of cavalry,  
477 the batteries of light artillery, and such companies of in-  
478 fantry as may be mounted, viz: The purchase of travelling  
479 forges, blacksmiths' and shoeing tools, horse and mule shoes  
480 and nails, iron and steel for shoeing, hire of veterinary sur-  
481 geons, medicines for horses and mules, picket-ropes, and for

482 shoeing the horses of the corps named; also, generally, the  
 483 proper and authorized expenses for the movement and  
 484 operations of an army not expressly assigned to any other  
 485 department, three hundred (32) [and fifty] thousand dollars.

486 Barracks and quarters: For rent or hire of quarters for  
 487 troops, and for officers on military duty; of storehouses for  
 488 safe-keeping of military stores; of offices; of grounds for  
 489 camps and cantonments, and for temporary frontier stations;  
 490 for construction and repairs of temporary huts; of stables,  
 491 and other military buildings at established posts; for con-  
 492 struction and repair of hospitals; and for repairs of build-  
 493 ings occupied by the Army, (33) [seven hundred and fifty]  
 494 *five hundred* thousand dollars: *Provided*, That hereafter  
 495 barracks and quarters, and all buildings and structures what-  
 496 ever of a permanent nature, shall be constructed upon spe-  
 497 cial authority, to be given by act of Congress, except when  
 498 constructed by the troops; and no such structures whose  
 499 cost shall exceed (34) [ten] *twenty* thousand dollars shall be  
 500 erected or continued in erection unless by such authority so  
 501 specially granted.

502 Clothing and equipage: For purchase and manufacture  
 503 of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, and for preserving  
 504 and repacking stock of clothing, camp and garrison equi-  
 505 page, and materials on hand at the Schuylkill arsenal and

506 other depots, one hundred (35) [and twenty] thousand dol-  
 507 lars.

508 For the preservation of Army clothing and equipage,  
 509 fifty thousand dollars : *Provided*, That there shall be no  
 510 claim upon the United States for the use of any patent for  
 511 the manner of or material for doing the same.

512 Ordnance and ordnance stores : For purchase of ord-  
 513 nance and ordnance stores, to continue the armament of cer-  
 514 tain southern forts, one hundred thousand dollars.

515 (36) *For establishing and maintaining national mili-*  
 516 *tary cemeteries, fifty thousand dollars.*

#### 517 MISCELLANEOUS.

518 For payment of any balance due, or to be found due,  
 519 during the present fiscal year, to any State, for costs, charges,  
 520 and expenses contemplated and provided for in and by the  
 521 act approved July twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and  
 522 sixty-one, being an act to indemnify certain States for ex-  
 523 penses incurred by them in enrolling, equipping, and trans-  
 524 porting troops for the defense of the United States during  
 525 the late rebellion, one million dollars.

526 (37) [For this amount, to reimburse the appropriation  
 527 for subsisting the Army with the value of rations issued by  
 528 officers of the Army for subsisting Indians during the fiscal  
 529 year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-

530 one, two hundred and eighty-two thousand eight hundred  
 531 and ninety-three dollars and sixty-nine cents.]

532       SIGNAL OFFICE.—Observation and report of storms :  
 533 For manufacture, purchase, or repair of meteorological  
 534 and other necessary instruments; for telegraphing re-  
 535 ports; for expenses of storm-signals, announcing prob-  
 536 able approach and force of storms; for instrument-  
 537 shelters; for hire, furniture, and expense of offices main-  
 538 tained for public use in cities or posts receiving reports;  
 539 for maps, bulletins, and so forth, to be displayed in chambers  
 540 of commerce and board of trade rooms, and for distribution;  
 541 for books and stationery; and for incidental expenses not  
 542 otherwise provided for, sixty-one thousand and fifty dollars:  
 543 (38) *Provided, That no part of this appropriation, nor any*  
 544 *appropriation for the several Departments of the Govern-*  
 545 *ment, shall be expended for telegraphing between said De-*  
 546 *partments and their officers or agents, except at rates first to*  
 547 *be established by the Postmaster General, under section two*  
 548 *of chapter two hundred and thirty of the statutes of eighteen*  
 549 *hundred and sixty-six, when over lines subject thereto.*

550       To furnish transportation to insane volunteer soldiers at  
 551 any time entitled to be admitted into the Government hospi-  
 552 tal at Washington, one thousand dollars.

553       For expenses of the board of visitors at the Military  
 554 Academy at West Point, two thousand dollars.

555 Public buildings grounds in & around Washing-  
 556 ton, under the Chief of Engineers of the War Depart-  
 557 ment: For repairs and improvements, viz: For survey and  
 558 map in accordance with the provisions of the joint resolu-  
 559 tion of July fourteenth, eighteen hundred and seventy, one  
 560 thousand five hundred dollars.

561 For grading and paving circle at the intersection of Ver-  
 562 mont and Massachusetts avenues for fiscal years ending June  
 563 thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy, and June thirtieth,  
 564 eighteen hundred and seventy-one, five thousand seven hun-  
 565 dred and eighty-nine dollars and eighty-two cents.

566 For stationery for the office, one hundred and twenty-  
 567 four dollars and thirty-two cents.

568 For repairs on the Executive Mansion, ten thousand  
 569 three hundred and forty-five dollars.

570 For additional compensation to the assistant door-  
 571 keeper at the Executive Mansion, for the fiscal year ending  
 572 June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, three  
 573 hundred and sixty dollars.

574 For the Executive avenue and adjacent grounds,  
 575 recently inclosed, for grading, paving, and otherwise com-  
 576 pleting the work during the fiscal years ending June thir-  
 577 tieth, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, and June thirtieth,  
 578 eighteen hundred and seventy, (39) [twenty-one thousand six  
 579 hundred and seventy-nine dollars and forty-three] *twenty-*



580 *five thousand two hundred and nineteen dollars and twenty-*  
 581 *five cents.*

582       Contingencies of the Army prior to July first,  
 583 eighteen hundred and seventy : For fees of attorneys at law  
 584 employed by the War Department ; expenses of suits  
 585 incurred previous to act of June twenty-second, eighteen  
 586 hundred and seventy, creating the Department of Justice ;  
 587 the costs and charges of State penitentiaries for the care  
 588 and maintenance of United States military convicts confined  
 589 in them ; the pay of detectives and scouts ; and for com-  
 590 pensation of provost-marshals employed by the Secretary of  
 591 War in eighteen hundred and sixty-two, fifty thousand  
 592 dollars.

593       Freedmen's hospitals and asylum : To reimburse the  
 594 Commissary Department for supplies furnished the Freed-  
 595 men's Bureau prior to June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and

607 NAVAL ESTABLISHMENT.

608 Marine Corps: For rent of quarters for officers, where  
 609 there are no public quarters, one thousand five hundred and  
 610 thirty-nine dollars and thirteen cents.

611 For forage for horses belonging to field and staff offi-  
 612 cers of the marines, one thousand four hundred and forty-  
 613 seven dollars and thirty-four cents.

614 For indispensable miscellaneous articles for the use of  
 615 the marine barracks at Brooklyn, New York, and for other  
 616 posts, seven hundred and thirty-one dollars and sixty cents.

617 (40) *This item and the two preceding items are for the fiscal*  
 618 *year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one.*

619 *For hire of officers' quarters where there are no public*  
 620 *quarters, eight thousand three hundred and fifty-four dollars.*

621 *For forage for horses for field and staff officers, three*  
 622 *thousand five hundred and forty dollars.*

623 *For pay account for per diem to Marine Band, one*  
 624 *thousand five hundred dollars. This item and the two pre-*  
 625 *ceding items are for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth,*  
 626 *eighteen hundred and seventy-two.*

627 For completion of the survey of a route for a ship-  
 628 canal between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, by the routes

629 of Tehuantepec and Nicaragua, with reports upon the same,  
 630 twenty (41) [-five] thousand dollars.

631                   **INTERIOR DEPARTMENT.**

632                               **PENSION-OFFICE.**

633           To reimburse the contingent fund of the Pension-Office  
 634 for expenses incurred in removing the papers and files of  
 635 said office to the Seaton House, and in refitting rooms in  
 636 said building, the sum of ten thousand five hundred and fifty-  
 637 seven dollars and seventy-eight cents.

638           To pay six clerks of class one and six clerks of class  
 639 two, to be employed in the examination of claims for pen-  
 640 sions to the survivors of the war of eighteen hundred and  
 641 twelve, which the Secretary is hereby authorized to employ  
 642 for one year, and no longer, fifteen thousand six hundred  
 643 dollars; and this appropriation is available for said purpose  
 644 for one year, and no longer.

660 To provide for the (44) [printing] *plates* of an Official  
 661 Gazette of the Patent-Office abstracts of the drawings of  
 662 patents issued, thirteen thousand three hundred and thirty-  
 663 three dollars, to be expended under the direction of the  
 664 Commissioner of Patents: *Provided*, That (45) [a] *one*  
 665 copy of said Gazette shall be (46) [sent to each of such  
 666 public libraries, not exceeding ten in each congressional dis-  
 667 trict and Territory, as may be designated by the member  
 668 of the House from such district or Territory,] *furnished to*  
 669 *each Senator, Representative, and Delegate in Congress;*  
 670 *and four copies shall be sent to such public libraries as may*  
 671 *be designated by each Senator, Representative, and Delegate,*  
 672 *and two copies to the Library of Congress: Provided further,*  
 673 *That a subscription-price of not less than five dollars per*

678 For the additional expense of printing and stitching the  
679 Patent-Office Official Gazette, with the abstracts of specifi-  
680 cations and drawings, five thousand four hundred and  
681 twenty-five dollars.

682 (49) *CENSUS.*

683 *To supply a deficiency in the appropriation for the*  
684 *expenses of the ninth census, twenty thousand dollars.*

685 **PUBLIC WORKS.**

686 Columbia Institute for the Deaf and Dumb: For fur-  
687 nishing and fitting up the buildings of the institution, six  
688 thousand dollars.

689 For repairs of buildings of said institute during fiscal  
690 year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-  
691 two, three thousand five hundred dollars.

692 To commence the proper fitting-up, in a fire-proof man-  
693 ner, of the vacant apartments, in the Smithsonian Institu-  
694 tion building for the proper distribution and exhibition of  
695 the Government collections of natural history, geology, and  
696 mineralogy, five thousand dollars.

697 For the preparation and publication of the maps, charts,  
698 geological sections, and other engravings necessary to illus-  
699 trate the Final Report of the United States Geological Sur-  
700 vey of the Territories, by Professor Hayden, ten thousand

701 dollars, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary  
702 of the Interior.

703 For the payment of clerks in the office of the surveyor  
704 general of the State of Louisiana, one thousand five hundred  
705 dollars.

706 For the repair and improvement of the Congressional  
707 Cemetery, to be expended under the direction of the warden  
708 and vestry of Washington Parish, District of Columbia, three  
709 thousand dollars.

710 (50) *For the completion of the United States court-*  
711 *house at Charlestown, South Carolina, one hundred and two*  
712 *dollars and eight cents.*

### 713 CAPITOL EXTENSION.

714 For the purpose of buying and putting in place a new  
715 boiler, water-tank, and steam-pump in the (51) [engine-room  
716 of the House of Representatives] *south wing of the Capitol,*  
717 ten thousand dollars ; and the disbursing clerk of the Interior  
718 Department is hereby required to disburse all moneys appro-  
719 priated for the United States Capitol extension and improve-  
720 ment of the grounds, and to receive therefor an annual com-  
721 pensation of one thousand dollars, to be paid from said  
722 appropriation, from October first, eighteen hundred and sev-  
723 enty-one : *Provided,* That in the adjustment of the accounts  
724 of F. W. Clemons, late disbursing agent of the Capitol exten-

### 735 INDIAN BUREAU.

736 For this amount, to pay to the Seneca Indians the  
 737 interest due on the sum of forty thousand dollars, held in  
 738 trust for them as provided in the treaty of February twenty-  
 739 third, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, from June eight-  
 740 eenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, the date of the  
 741 ratification of said treaty, to November first, eighteen hun-  
 742 dred and seventy-one, the date when interest on stocks  
 743 purchased with said sum of forty thousand dollars com-  
 744 menced to accrue, six thousand seven hundred and thirty-  
 745 three dollars and thirty-three cents; which amount shall be  
 746 paid direct to said Seneca Indians, and not to an agent, attor-  
 747 ney, or other person claiming to act for them.

748 For this amount, to replace the sum appropriated by  
 749 the act of July twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred and sixty-  
 750 six, under the provision of the sixth article of treaty with

751 the Seminoles of March twenty-first, eighteen hundred and  
752 sixty-six, and ninth article of the treaty with the Creeks of  
753 June fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, for the  
754 erection of agency buildings on the reservations of said  
755 tribes, twenty thousand dollars.

756 For this amount, to enable the Secretary of the Interior  
757 to supply the Kaw tribe of Indians in Kansas with subsist-  
758 ence, to relieve their immediate and pressing wants, the  
759 same to be reimbursed to the United States from the pro-  
760 ceeds of the sale of lands of the said Indians, when the  
761 same shall have been sold under existing treaty stipulations,  
762 ten thousand dollars.

763 (53) [That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he  
764 hereby is, authorized to expend, for the removal of Chip-  
765 pewa Indians to the White Earth Lake reservation, in Min-  
766 nesota, for their subsistence for six months after their  
767 removal, and for improvements on the said reservation, the  
768 unexpended balance of appropriations heretofore made for  
769 such removal, subsistence, and so forth, and now on the  
770 books of the Treasury Department, amounting in the aggre-  
771 gate to fifty-seven thousand and seventy-nine dollars and  
772 forty-four cents.]

773 For this amount, or so much thereof as may be neces-  
774 sary, for subsisting the Navajo Indians in New Mexico, for



775 the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and  
 776 seventy-two, sixty thousand dollars.

777 For this amount, or so much thereof as may be neces-  
 778 sary, to subsist the Apache Indians of Arizona and New  
 779 Mexico during the remainder of the present fiscal year, (54)  
 780 *who shall be upon the reservations and peacefully remain there,*  
 781 *or who shall otherwise maintain peaceful relations with the*  
 782 *United States*, one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars.

783 For this amount, or so much thereof as may be neces-  
 784 sary, for the subsistence, civilization, and care of the  
 785 Arickaree, Gros Ventre, and Mandan Indians, at Fort  
 786 Berthold agency, Dakota, during the remainder of the  
 787 present fiscal year, forty thousand dollars.

788 For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary,  
 789 for the subsistence of the Indians at the (55) [Mink] *Milk*  
 790 River agency, in Montana, (including eight thousand Sioux  
 791 now collected at that place,) for the fiscal year ending June  
 792 thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, one hundred  
 793 thousand dollars.

794 For this amount, to be expended under the direction of  
 795 the Secretary of the Interior, in providing subsistence and  
 796 clothing for the Osage Indians, and aiding them in estab-  
 797 lishing themselves in their new homes, to be reimbursed to  
 798 the United States from the interest on the net proceeds of  
 799 the sale of their lands in Kansas, as provided by the second  
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800 article of the treaty with the Great and Little Osages, of  
 801 September twenty-nine, eighteen hundred and sixty-five,  
 802 and the twelfth section of the act of July fifteen, eighteen  
 803 hundred and seventy, fifty thousand dollars : *Provided,*  
 804 That no person shall receive any part of the money appro-  
 805 priated by this act for any services or pretended services as  
 806 attorney, counsellor, or agent, for any tribe, or Indian, or  
 807 Indians, for whom any part of these appropriations are  
 808 made. Any person violating this provision shall be deemed  
 809 guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined in double the  
 810 amount so received.

811       (56) *For this amount, being the balance on account due*  
 812 *the Quapaw tribe of Indians for a certain tract of land in the*  
 813 *State of Kansas, containing seven thousand six hundred and*  
 814 *thirty-two hundredths acres, ceded by said tribe to the United*  
 815 *States in accordance with the terms of the fourth article of*  
 816 *the treaty with Senecas, Mixed Senecas, and Shawnees,*  
 817 *Quapaws, Confederate Peorias, Kaskaskias, Weas, and*  
 818 *Piankeshaws, Ottawas of Blanchard's Fork and Roche de*  
 819 *Bœuf, and certain Wyandotts, concluded February twenty-*  
 820 *third, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, (Statutes, volume*  
 821 *fifteen, page five hundred and thirteen,) four thousand five*  
 822 *hundred dollars and forty cents.*

823       *For this amount, to be taken from any funds in the*  
 824 *Treasury of the United States belonging to the Confederate*

825 *bands of Peorias, Kaskaskias, Weas, and Piankeshaws, to*  
 826 *make good to the Quapaw tribe of Indians the estimated*  
 827 *value of eighteen thousand five hundred and twenty-two*  
 828 *and fifty hundredths acres of land lying south of*  
 829 *Kansas, ceded by them to the United States under the*  
 830 *terms of the fourth article of the treaty with the Senecas,*  
 831 *Mixed Senecos and Shawnees, Quapaws, Confederated*  
 832 *Peorias, Kaskaskias, Weas and Piankeshaws, Ottawas of*  
 833 *Blanchard's Fork and Roche de Bœuf, and certain Wy-*  
 834 *andotts, concluded February twenty-third, eighteen hundred*  
 835 *and sixty-seven, (Statutes, volume fifteen, page five hundred*  
 836 *and thirteen,) which lands were, by the twenty-second article of*  
 837 *said treaty, granted and sold to the confederated bands of*  
 838 *Peorias, Kaskaskias, Weas, and Piankeshaws, at the same*  
 839 *rate as paid by the Government, twenty-one thousand three*  
 840 *hundred dollars and eighty-seven cents.*

842 DISTRICT COURTS OF THE UNITED STATES.—For sala-  
 843 ries of district judges for the fiscal year ending June thirtieth,  
 844 eighteen hundred and seventy-two, fourteen thousand three  
 845 hundred and twenty-five dollars.

846 For defraying the expenses of the courts of the United  
 847 States, including the District of Columbia; for jurors and  
 848 witnesses, and expenses of suits in which the United States  
 849 are concerned of prosecutions for offenses committed against

850 the United States ; for the safe-keeping of prisoners ; and for  
 851 the expenses which may be incurred in the enforcement of the  
 852 act of February twenty-eighth, eighteen hundred and sev-  
 853 enty-one, for the four months ending June thirtieth, eighteen  
 854 hundred and seventy-two, one million dollars.

855 To enable the commissioners on revision of the statutes  
 856 of the United States to expedite the work and furnish clerical  
 857 and other assistance, and supply contingencies, the sum of  
 858 (57) [nine] *three* thousand dollars is hereby appropriated,  
 859 to be paid from time to time as the work progresses, upon  
 860 vouchers approved by all the commissioners: (58) [*Pro-*  
 861 *vided*, That this appropriation shall continue available until  
 862 the completion of the work.]

863 To enable the clerk of the Court of Claims to pay  
 864 attorneys', commissioners', and marshals' fees for the years  
 865 ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy, and  
 866 June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, eight  
 867 hundred dollars; and for attorneys' and commissioners' fees,  
 868 paid by the clerk of the court in excess of the appropri-  
 869 ations for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred  
 870 and seventy, three hundred and forty-one dollars and four-  
 871 teen cents.

872 To purchase books for the Department of Justice, two  
 873 thousand five hundred dollars.

874 To enable the Secretary of the Treasury (59) *in his discre-*

875 *tion* to pay the judgment entered by the circuit court of the  
876 United States for the northern district of Florida, in the case  
877 of Theodore T. Edgerton against Jesse W. Culpeper, deputy  
878 collector and inspector of customs at Cedar Keys, district of  
879 Saint Marks, Florida, on the seventeenth day of December,  
880 eighteen hundred and seventy, for the sum of twenty-seven  
881 thousand four hundred dollars, with costs, twenty-six dollars,  
882 and interest at the rate of six per centum per annum from  
883 date of judgment until paid, a sufficient sum is hereby  
884 appropriated.

885       That the Secretary of the Treasury be authorized and  
886 directed, in the adjustment of the accounts of William E.  
887 Parker, United States marshal for the eastern district of  
888 Texas, to allow eight hundred and twenty-five dollars and  
889 seventy-five cents, money paid by said Parker for the trav-  
890 eling expenses of Thomas H. Duval, judge of the western  
891 district of Texas, for holding two terms of the United States  
892 circuit and district court at Galveston, and one term at  
893 Brownsville, in Texas, under the direction of Mr. Justice  
894 Swayne.

1       SEC. 2. That the proper accounting officers be, and  
2 hereby are, authorized and required, in the settlement of all  
3 accounts for the services of laborers, workmen, and mechanics  
4 employed by or on behalf of the Government of the United  
5 States, between the twenty-fifth day of June, eighteen hun-

6 dred and sixty-eight, the date of the act constituting eight  
 7 hours a day's work for all such laborers, workmen, and  
 8 mechanics, and the nineteenth day of May, eighteen hundred  
 9 and sixty-nine, the date of the proclamation of the President  
 10 concerning such pay, to settle and pay for the same, without  
 11 reduction on account of reduction of hours of labor by said  
 12 act, (60) *when it shall be made to appear that such was the*  
 13 *sole cause of the reduction of wages*, and a sufficient sum  
 14 for said purpose is hereby appropriated out of any money  
 15 in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated: (61) [*Pro-*  
 16 *vided, That no part of the money hereby appropriated*  
 17 *shall be paid to any mechanics or laborers who have*  
 18 *already been paid for eight hours' labor four-fifths as*  
 19 *much as the amount which was paid to like laborers and*  
 20 *mechanics for ten hours' labor.*]

1 (62) SEC. 3. *That all persons born in the district or coun-*  
 2 *try formerly known as the Territory of Oregon, and subject to*  
 3 *the jurisdiction of the United States at this time, are citizens*  
 4 *of the United States in the same manner as if born elsewhere*  
 5 *in the United States.*

1 (63) SEC. 4. *That the appropriation for building a pier*  
 2 *at Lewes, Delaware, contained in sections twelve and thirteen*  
 3 *of the act approved July fifteenth, eighteen hundred and sev-*  
 4 *enty, entitled "An act making appropriations for sundry*  
 5 *civil expenses of the Government for the year ending June*

6 *thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and for other*  
 7 *purposes," be, and the same is hereby, continued until June*  
 8 *thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three.*

1 (64) SEC. 5. *That the jurisdiction of the Court of Claims*  
 2 *under the act approved March twelfth, eighteen hundred and*  
 3 *sixty-three, entitled "An act to provide for the collection*  
 4 *of abandoned property and for the prevention of*  
 5 *frauds in insurrectionary districts within the United*  
 6 *States," and any act amendatory thereof or in relation*  
 7 *thereto, shall extend only to cases duly commenced in said*  
 8 *court within two years after the suppression of the*  
 9 *rebellion, in which it shall be established as a fact,*  
 10 *by proof satisfactory to said court, that the owner*  
 11 *of such property has never, in fact, given any aid or comfort*  
 12 *to said rebellion; and no judgment of said court, in any*  
 13 *case, under said acts shall be paid unless such finding shall*  
 14 *be stated as a proven fact in the judgment of said court:*  
 15 *Provided, That the provisions of this section shall not*  
 16 *apply to or embrace judgments heretofore rendered by*  
 17 *the Court of Claims in which it has been found as a*  
 18 *proven fact that the claimant has not given aid or comfort*  
 19 *to the rebellion: And provided, That proof of loyalty*  
 20 *to the United States, or of not giving aid and com-*  
 21 *fort to the rebellion, shall not be required of any*  
 22 *party to a suit cognizable by the Court of Claims*

23 *founded on contract with the United States entered into since*  
24 *the suppression of the rebellion : And provided further, That*  
25 *on any judgment heretofore rendered in favor of claimants*  
26 *in which the question of loyalty was not passed on, the court, on*  
27 *application of the claimant, may hear, determine, and certify*  
28 *as to the question of loyalty as shown by the evidence on the*  
29 *record.*
