During consideration of this measure today, Senate took the following action:

By 59 yeas to 34 nays (Vote No. 9), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn not having voted in the affirmative, Senate failed to agree to close further debate on Amendment No. 3184, listed above. **Pages S906–07**

A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing for further consideration of the bill, the amendments pending thereto, and further amendments to be proposed thereto. **Page S999**

Senate will resume consideration of the bill on Wednesday, February 7, 1996.
