Mr. LOTT. Mr. President, for the information of all Senators, the Senate will begin consideration of the continuing resolution at 1 p.m., on Monday. Several amendments are expected to be offered. However, any votes with respect to those amendments will be postponed to occur on Tuesday, at a time to be determined by the two leaders. Therefore, there will be no rollcall votes during Monday's session of the Senate.

In addition, Mr. President, a cloture motion was filed on both the D.C. appropriations conference report and the legislation with respect to Whitewater. Under a previous order, those two cloture votes will occur beginning at 2:15 p.m., Tuesday, and they will be back-

to-back votes. Additional amendments and votes will occur on Tuesday with respect to the continuing resolution. It is the hope of the leadership that the continuing resolution can be completed by the close of business Tuesday.
