### Chamber Action

*Frank M. Tejeda Post Office Building:* Committee on Governmental Affairs was discharged from the further consideration of H.R. 499, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service under construction at 7411 Barlito Boulevard in San Antonio, Texas, as the "Frank M. Tejeda Post Office Building", and the bill was then passed, clearing the measure for the President. **Pages S1650–51**

*Recognizing Frank Sinatra:* Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs was discharged from the further consideration of S. 305, to authorize the President to award a gold medal on behalf of the Congress to Francis Albert "Frank" Sinatra in recognition of his outstanding and enduring contributions through his entertainment career and humanitarian activities, and the bill was then passed. **Pages S1686–87**

**Balanced Budget Constitutional Amendment:** Senate continued consideration of S.J. Res. 1, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to require a balanced budget, taking action on amendments proposed thereto, as follows: **Page S1593**

Feinstein Amendment No. 11, in the nature of a substitute. (By 67 yeas to 33 nays (Vote No. 15), Senate tabled the amendment.) **Pages S1593–S1606**

By 37 yeas to 63 nays (Vote No. 16), Torricelli Amendment No. 15, to permit limited waiver when a declaration of war is in effect, national security is threatened, during economic emergencies, and allow a capital budget. **Pages S1606–28**

Dorgan Amendment No. 17, in the nature of a substitute. (By 59 yeas to 41 nays (Vote No. 17), Senate tabled the amendment. **Pages S1628–44**

Boxer Amendment No. 16, to provide Federal assistance to supplement State and local efforts to alleviate the damage, loss, hardship and suffering caused by disasters or emergencies by exempting spending that is designated emergency requirements by both the President and the Congress. (By 60 yeas to 40 nays (Vote No. 18), Senate tabled the amendment.) **Pages S1644–49**
