Measures Passed:

Criminal History Records: Senate passed S. 2294, to facilitate the exchange of criminal history records for noncriminal justice purposes, to provide for the decentralized storage of criminal history records, and to amend the National Child Protection Act of 1993 to facilitate the fingerprint checks authorized by that Act. **Pages S8069–73**

Crime Identification Technology Act: Senate passed S. 2022, to provide for the improvement of interstate criminal justice identification, information, communications, and forensics, after agreeing to a committee amendment, and the following amendment proposed thereto: **Pages S8073–82**

Allard (for Hatch) Amendment No. 3126, to facilitate the exchange of criminal history records for noncriminal justice purposes, to provide for the decentralized storage of criminal history records, and to amend the National Child Protection Act of 1993 to facilitate the fingerprint checks authorized by that Act. **Pages S8074–78**

Crime Victims With Disabilities Awareness Act: Senate passed S. 1976, to increase public awareness of the plight of victims of crime with developmental disabilities, to collect data to measure the magnitude of the problem, and to develop strategies to address the safety and justice needs of victims of crime with developmental disabilities, after agreeing to a committee amendment in the nature of a substitute. **Pages S8082–84**

Federal Property Rights: Senate began consideration of the motion to proceed to the consideration of S. 2271, to simplify and expedite access to the Federal courts for injured parties whose rights and privileges, secured by the United States Constitution, have been deprived by final actions of Federal agencies, or other government officials or entities acting under color of State law. **Pages S8022–48**

Also, by 52 yeas to 42 nays (Vote No. 197), three-fifths of those Senators duly chosen and sworn not having voted in the affirmative, Senate rejected a motion to close further debate on the motion to proceed to consideration of the bill. **Pages S8048–49**

Agriculture Appropriations, 1999: Senate resumed consideration of S. 2159, making appropriations for Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies programs for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1999, taking action on amendments proposed thereto, as follows: **Page S8049**

Daschle Amendment No. 2729, to reform and structure the processes by which tobacco products are manufactured, marketed, and distributed, to prevent the use of tobacco products by minors, and to redress the adverse health effects of tobacco use. **Page S8049**

Motion to waive section 302(f) of the Congressional Budget Act with respect to consideration of Amendment No. 2729, listed above. **Page S8049**

A unanimous-consent time-agreement was reached providing for consideration of the pending motion on Tuesday, July 14, 1998, with a vote to occur thereon. **Page S8049**
