Records of the Select Committee on Missing Persons in Southeast Asia: H. Res. 172, to authorize and direct the Archivist of the United States to make available for public use the records of the House of Representatives Select Committee on Missing Persons in Southeast Asia; **Pages H6359-60**

Organ Donor Leave Act: H.R. 457, to amend title 5, United States Code, to increase the amount of leave time available to a Federal employee in any year in connection with serving as an organ donor; **Pages H6360-62**

Technical Corrections to Digital Copyright Law: S. 1260, to make technical corrections in title 17, United States Code, and other laws—clearing the measure for the President; **Pages H6362-63**

Recess: The House recessed at 4:45 p.m. and reconvened at 6:01 p.m. **Page H6377**

Regulatory Right-to-Know Act: The House passed H.R. 1074, to provide Governmentwide accounting of regulatory costs and benefits, by a recorded vote of 254 ayes to 157 noes, Roll No. 336. **Pages H6365-79**

Agreed to the Committee amendment in the nature of a substitute made in order by the rule. **Page H6378**

Agreed to the McIntosh en bloc amendment that makes technical corrections specifying that the OMB Director submits the reports; delays the requirement for the analysis of impacts on public health and safety, the environment, consumer protection, equal opportunity, and other public policy goals; and exempts any matter relating to monetary policy. **Pages H6373-74**

Rejected the Hoeffel amendment that sought to require an analysis on the extent to which costs imposed on incorporated entities by regulatory programs are offset by Federal subsidies, including grants and preferential loans; limits expenditures to carry out the act to \$1 million; and sunsets the act at the end of 4 years, rejected by a recorded vote of 192 ayes to 217 noes, Roll No. 335. Pages H6374-78

VA, HUD, AND INDEPENDENT AGENCIES APPROPRIATIONS

Committee on Appropriations: Subcommittee on VA, HUD, and Independent Agencies approved for full committee action, the VA, HUD, and Independent Agencies appropriations for fiscal year 2000.

ENERGY AND WATER DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS

Committee on Rules: Granted, by voice vote, an open rule providing 1 hour of debate on H.R. 2605, making appropriations for energy and water development for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000. The rule waives clause 4(a) of rule XIII (requiring a 3 day layover of the committee report) against consideration of the bill. The rule waives clause 2 of rule

XXI (prohibiting unauthorized or legislative provisions in an appropriations bill) and clause 5(a) of rule XXI (prohibiting a tax or tariff provision in a bill not reported by a committee with jurisdiction over revenue measures) against provisions in the bill, except as otherwise specified in the rule. The rule authorizes the Chair to accord priority in recognition to Members who have pre-printed their amendments in the Congressional Record. The rule allows the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole to postpone votes during consideration of the bill, and to reduce voting time to five minutes on a postponed question if the vote follows a fifteen minute vote. Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit, with or without instructions. Testimony was heard from Representatives Packard and Visclosky.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA APPROPRIATIONS

Committee on Rules: The Committee granted, by voice vote, an open rule providing 1 hour of debate on H.R. 2587, making appropriations for the government of the District of Columbia and other activities chargeable in whole or in part against revenues of said District for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2000. The rule waives clause 4(c) of rule XIII (requiring a three-day availability of printed hearings on a general appropriations bill), section 306 (prohibiting consideration of legislation within the Budget Committee's jurisdiction, unless reported by the Budget Committee, and section 401 (prohibiting consideration of legislation providing new entitlement authority which becomes effective during the current fiscal year) of the Congressional Budget Act against consideration of the bill. The rule waives clause 2 of rule XXI (prohibiting unauthorized or legislative provisions in an appropriations bill) against provisions in the bill. The rule makes in order the amendments printed in the Rules Committee report which may be offered only by a Member designated in the report and only at the appropriate point in the reading of the bill, shall be debatable for the time specified in the report equally divided and controlled between the proponent and an opponent, and shall not be subject to amendment. The rule waives all points of order against the amendments printed in the Rules Committee report. The rule authorizes the Chair to accord priority in recognition to Members who have pre-printed their amendments in the Congressional Record. The rule allows the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole to postpone votes during consideration of the bill, and to reduce voting time to five minutes on a postponed question if the vote follows a fifteen minute vote. Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit, with or without instructions. Testimony was

heard from Representatives Istook, Tiahrt, Barr of Georgia, Bilbray, Moran of Virginia and Norton.
