*Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs:* Committee concluded oversight hearings on the Monetary Policy Report to Congress pursuant to the Full Employment and Balanced Growth Act of 1978, after receiving testimony from Alan Greenspan, Chairman, Board of Governors, Federal Reserve System.

### BUSINESS MEETING

*Committee on Energy and Natural Resources:* Committee ordered favorably reported the following bills:

S. 244, to authorize the construction of the Lewis and Clark Rural Water System and to authorize assistance to the Lewis and Clark Rural Water System, Inc., a nonprofit corporation, for the planning and construction of the water supply system, with an amendment in the nature of a substitute;

S. 1330, to give the city of Mesquite, Nevada, the right to purchase at fair market value certain parcels of public land in the city; and

S. 1329, to direct the Secretary of the Interior to convey certain land to Nye County, Nevada.

### WATER BILLS

*Committee on Energy and Natural Resources:* Subcommittee on Water and Power concluded hearings on S. 624, to authorize construction of the Fort Peck Reservation Rural Water System in the State of Montana, S. 1211, to amend the Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Act to authorize additional measures to carry out the control of salinity upstream of Imperial Dam in a cost-effective manner, S. 1275, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to produce and sell products and to sell publications relating to the Hoover Dam, and to deposit revenues generated from the sales into the Colorado River Dam fund, S. 1236, to extend the deadline under the Federal Power Act for commencement of the

construction of the Arrowrock Dam Hydroelectric Project in the State of Idaho, S. 1377, to amend the Central Utah Project Completion Act regarding the use of funds for water development for the Bonneville Unit, and S. 986, to direct the Secretary of the Interior to convey the Griffith Project to the Southern Nevada Water Authority, after receiving testimony from Senators Reid and Baucus; Steve Richardson, Chief of Staff, Bureau of Reclamation, Department of the Interior; John E. Tubbs, Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation, Helena; Spike Bighorn, Assiniboine and Sioux Tribes of the Fort Peck Reservation, Poplar, Montana; Rick Knick, Dry Prairie Rural Water, Culberston, Montana; Jack A. Barnett, Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Forum, Bountiful, Utah; and Patricia Mulroy, Southern Nevada Water Authority, Las Vegas.

S. Res. 166, relating to the recent elections in the Republic of Indonesia, with an amendment;

S. Con. Res. 48, relating to the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation Forum; and

Peter Burleigh, of California, to be Ambassador to the Republic of the Philippines and to serve concurrently and without additional compensation as Ambassador to the Republic of Palau, J. Gelbard, of Washington, to be Ambassador to the Republic of Indonesia, Barbara J. ### GLOBAL CLIMATE CHANGE

*Committee on Foreign Relations:* Subcommittee on International Economic Policy, Export and Trade Promotion held hearings on activities of the Agency for International Development to limit pollution, improve energy efficiency and preserve the world's resources, focusing on the impact of global climate change on international economic development and ecological balance, receiving testimony from Harriet Babbitt, Acting Administrator, United States Agency for International Development.

### COMBATING METHAMPHETAMINE PROLIFERATION

*Committee on the Judiciary:* Committee concluded hearings on combating the problem of methamphetamine manufacturing and trafficking proliferation in the United States, and S. 1428, to amend the Controlled Substances Act and the Controlled Substances Import and Export Act relating to the manufacture, traffic, import, and export of amphetamine and methamphetamine, after receiving testimony from Senator Harkin; Donnie R. Marshall, Acting Administrator, Drug Enforcement Administration, and Paul M. Warner, United States Attorney for the District of Utah, both of the Department of Justice; Katina Kypridakes, California Bureau of Narcotics Enforcement, Sacramento; Ron Doerge, Newton County Sheriff's Department and Jail, Neosho, Missouri, on behalf of the Southwest Missouri Drug Task Force; and John Vasica, Sandy, Utah.

S. 632, to provide assistance for poison prevention and to stabilize the funding of regional poison control centers; and
