#### PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS IMPLEMENTATION ACT

*Committee on Rules:* Granted, by voice vote, a structured rule providing 1 hour of debate on H.R. 2372, Private Property Rights Improvement Act of 1999. The rule makes in order the Committee on the Judiciary amendment in the nature of a substitute now printed in the bill as an original bill for the purpose of amendment. The rule makes in order only those amendments printed in the Rules Committee report accompanying the resolution. The rule provides that the amendments made in order may be offered only in the order printed in the report, may be offered only by a Member designated in the report, shall be considered as read, shall be debatable for the time specified equally divided and controlled by the proponent and an opponent, shall not be subject to amendment, and shall not be subject to a demand for a division of the question in the House or in the Committee of the Whole. The rule waives all points of order against the amendments printed in the report. The rule permits the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole to postpone votes during consideration of the bill, and to reduce voting time to five minutes on a postponed question if the vote follows a fifteen minute vote. Finally, the rule provides

one motion to recommit with or without instructions. Testimony was heard from Representatives Canady, Boehlert, Watt of North Carolina, Jackson-Lee of Texas, Waters and Traficant.
