RECOMMIT CONCURRENT BUDGET RESOLUTION

Committee on Rules: Granted, by voice vote, a resolution providing that upon adoption of the rule, the conference report to accompany H. Con. Res. 83, establishing the congressional budget for the United States Government for fiscal year 2002, revising the congressional budget for the United States Government for fiscal year 2001, and setting forth appropriate budgetary levels for each of fiscal years 2003 through 2011, shall be recommitted to the conference committee.

WILDFIRE MANAGEMENT ACT

Committee on Rules: Granted, by voice vote, an open rule providing 1 hour of general debate on H.R. 581, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture to use funds appropriated for wildland fire management in the Department of the Interior and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2001, to reimburse the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Marine Fisheries Service to facilitate the interagency cooperation required under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 in connection with wildland fire management. The rule waives section 311 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (prohibiting consideration of legislation or an amendment that would cause the total level of new budget authority or outlays in the most recent budget resolution to be exceeded, or

would cause revenues to be less) against consideration of the bill. The rule provides that the bill shall be open for amendment at any point. The rule waives all points of order against the bill. The rule authorizes the Chair to accord priority in recognition to Members who have preprinted their amendments in the Congressional Record. Finally, the rule provides one motion to recommit, with or without instructions. Testimony was heard from Representative Hefley.
