Recovery and Responses to Terrorist Attacks on the United States: The House passed H.R. 2888, making emergency supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year 2001 for additional disaster assistance, for anti-terrorism initiatives, and for assistance in the recovery from the tragedy that occurred on September 11, 2001 by a yea-and-nay vote of 422 yeas with none voting “nay”, Roll No. 341.

Earlier, agreed to consider the bill pursuant to a unanimous consent order.

Recess: The House recessed at 4:11 p.m. and reconvened at 5:45 p.m.

Page H5637

Authorization for Use of Military Force: The House passed H.J. Res. 64, to authorize the use of United States Armed Forces against those responsible for the recent attacks launched against the United States by a yea-and-nay vote of 420 yeas to 1 nay, Roll No. 342.

Pages H5638–83

Pursuant to the earlier order, the House was considered to have passed S.J. Res. 23, to authorize the use of United States Armed Forces against those responsible for the recent attacks launched against the United States. H.J. Res. 64 was then laid on the table.

Page H5683

Rejected the Tierney motion by voice vote to recommit the joint resolution to the Committee on International Relations with instructions to report it back to the House forthwith with an amendment that requires a report from the President at least once every 60 days.

Page H5681

Earlier agreed to consider the joint resolution pursuant to a unanimous consent order that provided that upon passage, the House shall be considered to have passed S.J. Res. 23.

Page H5638

Condemning Motor Fuel Price Gouging: The House agreed to H. Res. 238, condemning any price gouging with respect to motor fuels during the hours and days after the terrorist acts of September 11, 2001.

Condemning Bigotry and Violence Against Arabs, Muslims, and South Asians: The House agreed to H. Con. Res. 227, condemning bigotry and violence against Arab-Americans, American Muslims, and Americans from South Asia in the

wake of terrorist attacks in New York City, New York, and Washington, D.C., on September 11, 2001. **Pages H5691–98**

Permanent Authority for Admission of “S” Visa Non-immigrants: The House passed S. 1424, to amend the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide permanent authority for the admission of “S” visa non-immigrants—clearing the measure for the President. **Pages H5698–99**

Terrorist Victims Flag Memorial Resolution: The House agreed to H. Res. 239, providing Capitol-flown flags to each surviving victim, and the family of each deceased victim, of the terrorist attacks which occurred on September 11, 2001. **Pages H5699–H5700**

Presidential Message—Terrorist Attacks: Read a message from the President wherein he reported that he exercised his authority to declare a national emergency by reason of the terrorist attacks at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon and the continuing and immediate threat of further attacks on the United States. He further authorized the Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of Transportation with respect to the Coast Guard to order to active duty units and individual members not assigned to units of the Ready Reserve to perform such missions as may be necessary—referred to the Committees on International Relations and Armed Services and ordered printed (H. Doc. 107–118). **Pages H5700–01**

Meeting Hour—Monday, Sept. 17: Agreed that when the House adjourns today, it adjourn to meet at 12 noon on Monday, Sept. 17 in pro forma session. **Page H5701**
