Herbert H. Bateman Post Office Building: Senate passed H.R. 1749, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 685 Turnberry Road in Newport News, Virginia, as the “Herbert H. Bateman Post Office Building”, clearing the measure for the President. **Page S2339**

Bob Davis Post Office Building: Senate passed H.R. 2577, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 310 South State Street in St. Ignace, Michigan, as the “Bob Davis Post Office Building”, clearing the measure for the President. **Page S2339**

Francis Bardanoue United States Post Office Building: Senate passed H.R. 2876, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located in Harlem, Montana, as the “Francis Bardanoue United States Post Office Building”, clearing the measure for the President. **Page S2339**

Norman Sisisky Post Office Building: Senate passed H.R. 2910, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 3131 South Crater Road in Petersburg, Virginia, as the “Norman Sisisky Post Office Building”, clearing the measure for the President. **Page S2339**

Vernon Tarlton Post Office Building: Senate passed H.R. 3072, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 125 Main Street in Forest City, North Carolina, as the “Vernon Tarlton Post Office Building”, clearing the measure for the President. **Page S2339**

Raymond M. Downey Post Office Building: Senate passed H.R. 3379, to designate the facility of the United States Postal Service located at 375 Carlls Path in Deer Park, New York, as the “Raymond M.

Downey Post Office Building”, clearing the measure for the President. **Page S2339**

Child Abuse Awareness: Committee on the Judiciary was discharged from further consideration of S. Res. 132, recognizing the social problem of child abuse and neglect, and supporting efforts to enhance public awareness of it, and the resolution was then agreed to. **Page S2339**

Enrollment Correction: Senate agreed to H. Con. Res. 361, directing the Clerk of the House of Representatives to make corrections in the enrollment of the bill H.R. 2356. **Pages S2339–43**

Election Reform—Agreement: A unanimous-consent-time agreement was reached providing that the Majority Leader, after consultation with the Minority Leader, may resume consideration of S. 565, to establish the Commission on Voting Rights and Procedures to study and make recommendations regarding election technology, voting, and election administration, to establish a grant program under which the Office of Justice Programs and the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice shall provide assistance to States and localities in improving election technology and the administration of Federal elections, to require States to meet uniform and non-discriminatory election technology and administration requirements for the 2004 Federal elections, and certain amendments to be proposed thereto. **Page S2318**

Energy Policy Act—Agreement: A unanimous-consent agreement was reached providing for further consideration of S. 517, to authorize funding the Department of Energy to enhance its mission areas through technology transfer and partnerships for fiscal years 2002 through 2006, at 3 p.m., on Monday, April 8, 2002. **Page S2343**
