**Highway Funding Restoration Act:** H.R. 3694, amended, to provide for highway infrastructure investment at the guaranteed funding level contained in the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (agreed to by a 2/3 yea-and-nay vote of 410 yeas to 5 nays, Roll No. 159); **Pages H2406–13, H2427**

**Social Security Benefit Enhancements for Women Act:** H.R. 4069, to amend title II of the Social Security Act to provide for miscellaneous enhancements in Social Security benefits, and for other purposes (agreed to by a 2/3 yea-and-nay vote of 418 yeas with none voting “nay,” Roll No. 160). Agreed to amend the title so as to read: “To amend title II of the Social Security Act to provide for miscella-

neous enhancements in Social Security benefits, and for other purposes.”; and **Pages H2413–22, H2427–28**

**Prohibiting the Involuntary Wearing of the Abaya Garment by Members of the Armed Forces:** H.R. 4714, to prohibit members of the Armed Forces in Saudi Arabia from being required or formally or informally compelled to wear the abaya garment. **Pages H2422–27**

The rule provides that it shall be in order to consider as an original bill for the purpose of amendment the amendment in the nature of a substitute recommended by the Committee on International Relations now printed in the bill. The rule provides that the committee amendment in the nature of a substitute shall be considered by title rather than by section. The rule allows the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole to accord priority in recognition to those Members who have pre-printed their amendments in the Congressional Record. #### SAME DAY CONSIDERATION OF CERTAIN RESOLUTIONS

*Committee on Rules:* Granted, by voice vote, a modified closed rule providing 2 hours of debate on H.R. 4735, Personal Responsibility, Work, and Family Promotion Act of 2002, with 50 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Committee on Ways and Means, 40 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Committee on Education and the Workforce, and 30 minutes equally divided and controlled by the chairman and ranking minority member of the Committee on Energy and Commerce. The rule waives all points of order against consideration of the bill. The rule makes in order the amendment printed in the Rules Committee report accompanying the resolution, if offered by Representative Cardin of Maryland or his designee, which shall be considered as read, and shall be separately debatable for 1 hour equally divided and controlled by the proponent and an opponent. The rule waives all points of order against the amendment printed in the report. Finally the rule provides one motion to recommit with or without instructions. Heard testimony from Chairman Thomas and Representatives Herger, Boehner, McKeon, Tauzin, Levin, Cardin, Becerra, Mink of Hawaii, Owens, Scott, Woolsey, Tierney, Kind, Wu, Solis, Clayton, Carson of Indiana, Jackson-Lee of Texas, and Udall of New Mexico.
