The rule waives all points of order against the amendments printed in the report. The rule provides one motion to recommit with or without instructions. Section 2 of the resolution provides that the amendment considered as adopted under the first section of the resolution shall be considered an amendment offered under section 411 of House Concurrent Resolution 95.
