Gianni, Jr., Inspector General, both of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation; Davi M. D'Agostino, Director, Financial Markets and Community Investment, General Accounting Office; and JoAnn M. Back to Work Incentive Act: The House passed H.R. 444, to amend the Workforce Investment Act of 1998 to establish a Personal Reemployment Accounts grant program to assist Americans in returning to work, by a recorded vote of 213 ayes to 203 noes, Roll No. 225. **Pages H3725–40**

Agreed that in lieu of the amendment in the nature of a substitute recommended by the Committee on Education and the Workforce now printed in the bill, an amendment in the nature of a substitute consisting of the text of H.R. 4444 be considered as adopted. **Page H3727**

Rejected the Kildee motion to recommit the bill to the Committee on Education and the Workforce with instructions to report the bill back to the House forthwith with amendments, by a yea-and-nay vote of 199 yeas to 216 nays, Roll No. 224. **Pages H3738–40**

Pursuant to H. Res. 656, the texts of H.R. 4409, to reauthorize title II of the Higher Education Act of 1965, and H.R. 4411, to amend title VII of the Higher Education Act of 1965 to ensure graduate opportunities in postsecondary education, were appended to the engrossment of H.R. 444 and the bills H.R. 4409 and H.R. 4411 were laid on the table. **Page H3740**
