Whereupon,

Resolved, That while the Senate venerate the authority and dignity of the office of President of the United States, and will, at all times, as a high and essential power in the Constitution, exert themselves to maintain and preserve undiminished the whole Executive authority thereby established; they owe it to the trust confided to themselves, as well as to the States, their Constituents, to protect the power over appointments to office, which the constitution has placed in that body.
